"Just finished a few days on the Wind River of Wyoming (hit it earlier when it wasn't prime, so I went back). Fabulous! An interspersed pool and riffle fishery, with great fish-holding riffles.

Needless to say, on the riffles I popped Trude patterns (Royal, Lady Heather, and Rio Grande King). In every case there was a waiting fish, mostly rainbows. Nothing of spectacular size, but numerous fish. June wasn't a 400 fish month, but maybe July.

Two nights ago it was warm, and on the Clark Fork above Deer Lodge. I indulged in the first night fishing of the year (truly love the moments of dark, but only fish 10 to 20 nights a season).

The upper Clark Fork, because of deep holes and brown trout, is a great night stream. There is a very large moth (in process of finding out the scientific name) that is constantly flopping into the water. A dry muddler is a good imitation.

On this night, I cast the muddler in a selected hole, carefully fishing each occasional "gerwoosh"! At about 11 o'clock I caught a 3 pound brown (wondering what such a small fish was doing out at such a dangerous time of night). At about 1 o'clock I caught a 6 pound 5 ounce brown. (Ed. note: western fishing, anyone?)

Then I went downstream to find my partners and brag a little. I found Bill Seeples as he was wrestling a 10 lb. 12 oz. behemoth onto the shore (now being mounted). So all I could do was gape, not brag. Bill was so excited that I thought he was going to talk himself out of air and suffocate.

We proceeded on down to find Tom Welsh, a fella who "couldn't catch the big ones". We found him ———— waiting with a 7 lb. l oz. brown. Bill and Tom gloated all night, naturally, agreeing that any fool who couldn't catch at least a 7 lb. fish, shouldn't be out harassing the little ones!

Companions make or break a trip, and these two are great.

Most of my fishing this month has been in few hour stints (as usual), but July is normally the "hot" month for numbers. The night on the Clark Fork was the only notable occasion so far this month (except for maybe a 64 trout day on the Bitteroot, but that's the Bitteroot!)."
