5/1 - 5/22/76 ?? - stocking of 2000 brown trout (9"-12") from our rearing pool (in addition to regular state stocking).

5/22/76 - stocking of CFFA purchased and tagged fish (16*-20*, 2-41b)

5/23/76 - sponsor fly fishing outing for members and public; guides, maps, refreshments, and plenty of BIG fish available PLUS many valuable prizes given away for tags clipped and turned in that day, taken from CFFA tagged fish.

The climax of the Willimantic Project on the 23rd promises to be the "Biggy" of the year. Spread the word. Tell your friends. CFFA will set up headquarters in Nye Holeman State Forest, exit 100 off I-86, on Rt.44. There's plenty of room for picnicing, so bring the family.

Usage will be a prime factor in determining whether more such regulations will be established on other streams, perhaps closer to you. Get involved. Set aside some of your time to help out on one of the above dates or more. (If details don't appear elsewhere, contact My Schulman at 289-7803 eve.) This task is not going to be easy. But the more people involved, the lighter the load will be. I'll help. Will you?

Lastly, when a fish hits, the hook should be set by lifting the rod straight overhead. This will lift the line out of the water. A sideway strike with lots of line out, will slow the strike by pulling the line against the water.

You also need a fly that will float well in fast water and which will come off the water fast and dry quickly on false casts. It is hard to pick up a fly that is far out without drowning it, so dress them with a good floatant.

DOWNSTREAM DRY FLY FLOAT

(The following is reprinted from the August-September 1975 issue of <u>Flycaster</u>, a publication of the Golden Spread Flyfishers, who in turn had reprinted it from the July 1975 issue of <u>Flyline</u> published by the Inglewood Fly Fishermen.)

The classic dry fly technique has you casting directly across, or slightly upstream, mending the belly out of your line, and getting, if you are lucky, eight to ten feet of drag-free float. Want to get 30 or 40 feet of drag-free float?

The long float technique calls for a cast made directly downstream, or perhaps quartering downstream. Just before your fly hits the water, raise your rod tip sharply and simultaneously mend the line upstream. When the line hits the water, you've got a few feet of slack already, and your fly is the first thing heading downstream (not the leader).

Immediately before the slack runs out, begin stripping line from the reel. Strip line as fast as you can and throw big loops on the water with you rod tip. This way you always have a few feet of slack upstream of the fly, which continues riding high and dry downstream. With a good spot presentation, the fly can be floated directly over a rising fish, fly first. Heavier tippets can be used, since this method allows the leader to follow the fly into the fish's window.

There are some problems with this method. First, it is a big water technique, where long drag-free floats are essential. If the water is very fast, it may not be possible to strip line fast enough. It is a busy technique, that is, you are working all of the time, and after the umpteenth try, frustration, disgust, and fatigue will set in, in that order. If done properly, with spot casts above "fishy" areas, you won't need umpteen tries.

Second, it is a technique that requires constant practice. Each time you go out, make a few practice casts in safe areas till you get the feel again, then hit the good pool where you expect the fish to be. Wading must be done with great care and without scuffing the bottom. Otherwise, you will be sending debris and mud down and over the fish. (Continued on page 3)


