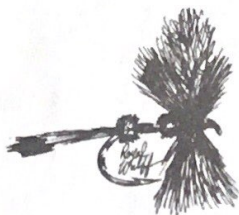

Guide Meeting

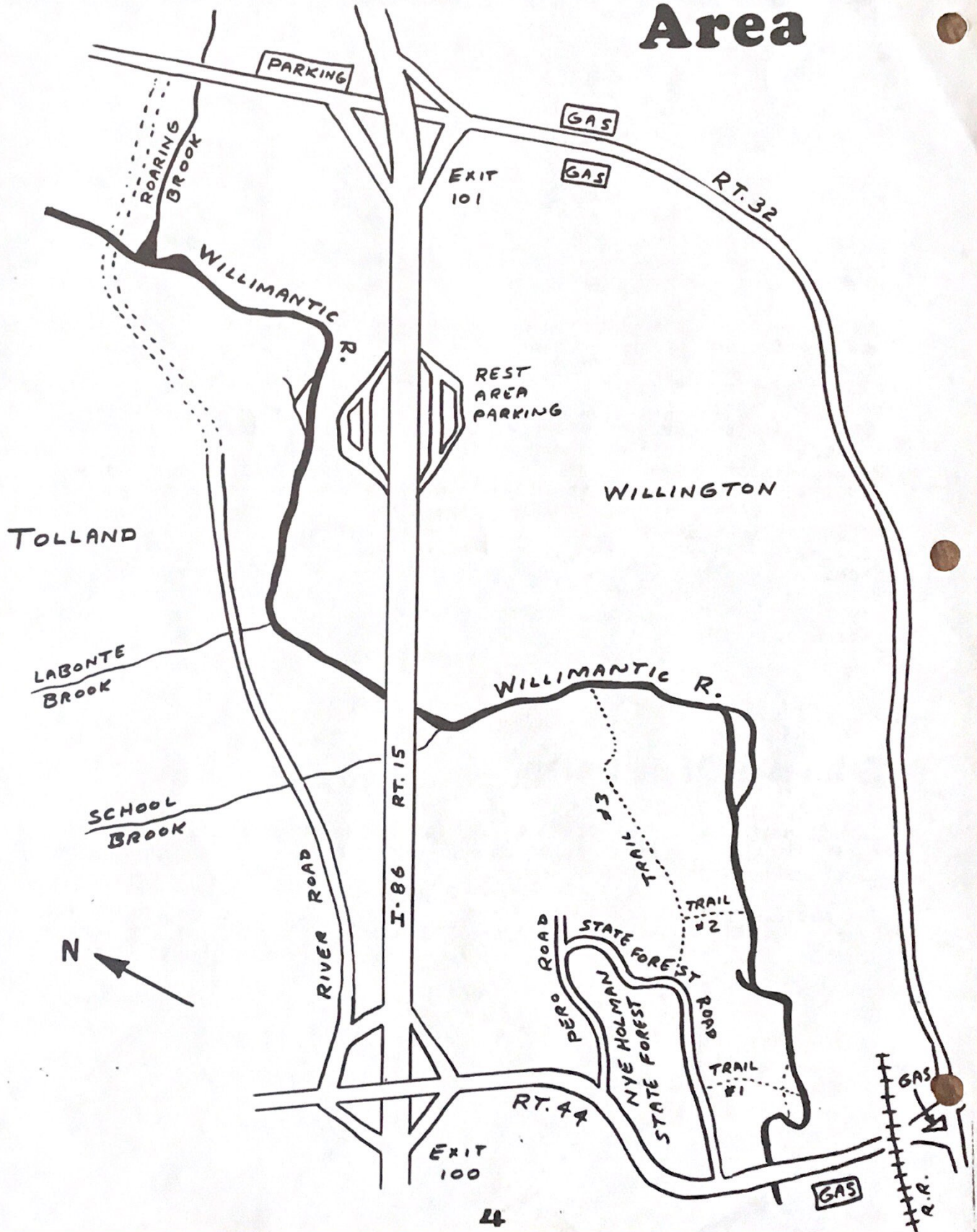
Any fishermen who would like to act as guides on the Willimantic River during the Fly fishing outing on May 23rd are asked to attend the Guide meeting one week earlier.

Tips on Technique

The following list of hints was prepared by the Eastern Council of CFFA, and will prove helpful not only during the Fly Fishing Only Outing on May 23rd, but throughout the season.

The map on the previous page will lead you to the fishing fun in the Fly-only area. The no-kill area starts at the junction of the Willi and Roaring Brook, and extends downstream to the bridge on Route 44.

Waders:

While there are limited areas that can be fished if you're wearing hip boots, you'll be able to cover more water if you're wearing waders. Also, a wading staff, while not required, might be helpful.

Guides:

Several CFFA members have volunteered to serve as guides for those people who are new to this area of the Willi River. To find a guide, check in for information at the meeting area.

Hooks:

Regulations require the use of single hook flies only. They must be barbless so the barbs must be pinched down or filed off on each and every fly you use.

Returning Fish:

ALL fish caught must be returned to the water. As a way of reducing the number of fish killed as a result of over handling, we suggest you use a landing net to hold the fish, in the water, while the fly is removed.

Tagged Fish:

In addition to the heavy State stocking and the 2000 fish raised and stocked by CFFA, there are a number of tagged fish also stocked by CFFA. If you catch one, CAREFULLY cut and remove both the nylon thread and the tag, return the fish to the water, and save the tag to be exchanged for a prize at the meeting area.

Litter:

CFFA has spent time cleaning up the general area for everyone's enjoyment. If you carried it in, carry it out.

Stream Courtesy:

During the course of the outing there will be a large number of people fishing and certain areas may become crowded. Please be considerate of other anglers and also set a good example for people who are less considerate than you are.

Random Casts

"Perhaps 'serious' is a puny word to describe the grip fly-fishing has on the hard-core trout. The compulsive golfer may spend hours worrying over and working on his backswing or some other mechanical aspect of his game. But have you ever heard of one who molds experimental golf balls? Designs and constructs his own clubs? Pores over scientific abstracts on grass species and sand composition? Or is a self-taught expert on subsoil drainage and winds-aloft gradients to improve his game? Even Jack Nicklaus doesn't go that far. Yet this is almost precisely what some fly-fishers do (by analogy, of course) when they get really hooked."

THE FEATHERED HOOK

by RON ZAWOYSKY

"TURKEY" WING CADDIS (TWC)

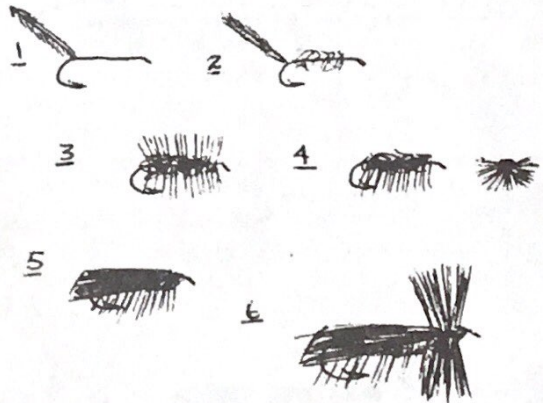
During this past year I have taken more trout on this fly than any other pattern. It has worked surprisingly well during caddis hatches as well as during mayfly hatches (this could very well be because most of my fishing was done on streams like the Battenkill and Beaverville where the caddis seems to always be present in some quantity). It has also proven very successful when fishing blind. It is also a very durable fly (I think I took at least 17 or 18 fish on a single fly). Two of the three variations which I tie are extremely good floaters and adapt very well to the "twitching" method of fishing the caddis fly. The third variation is designed to float flush in the film and has proven to be very effective when fishing flat, calm water when the fish were very selective.

In general, all three of the patterns are tied with the same three materials: hare's ear, ginger variant hackle, and cinnamon turkey quill (or a suitable substitute-e.a. peacock, pheasant, or grouse wing quill. All have the same mottled grayish, brown over a cream-colored background). I've never changed materials because I've always had luck with those mentioned and most of the caddis that I have encountered had these basic colors. However, an infinite number of variations is possible with a little imagination on the use of materials.

The three variations and their tying instructions are as follows:

TWC #1

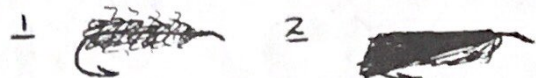
- 1 Tie on ginger hackle at bend of hook
- 2 Dub on hare's ear and wind a fuzzy body
- 3 Palmer body with ginger hackle
- 4 Trim hackle on top
- 5 "Roll" on turkey quill wing and trim to desired length
- 6 Tie on ginger hackle, wind, and whip finish the head



This TWC variation #1 is the one that I use most and usually start with. It floats very well in broken or fast water, and can be "skated" very well. In general, when fishing it you can expect the take to be very deliberate and at times quite violent.

TWC #2

- 1 Dub on hare's ear and wind a fuzzy body
- 2 "Roll" on turkey quill wing and trim to desired length



"TURKEY" WING CADDIS (TWC)

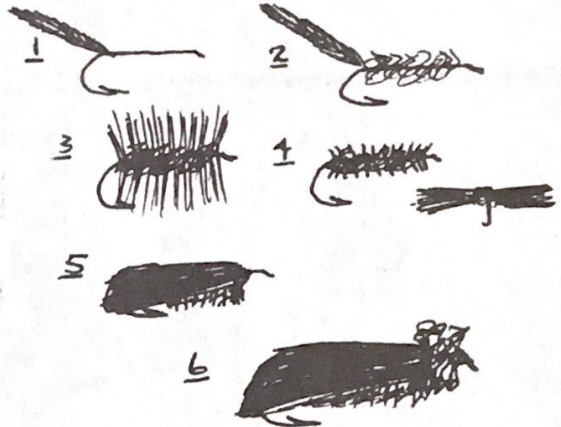
- 3 Tie on ginger variant hackle, wind, and whip finish the head



I usually switch to the TWC #2 when the fish tend to get a little finicky and want a more definite light pattern since the wing sits right in the film and gives the silhouette of a caddis.

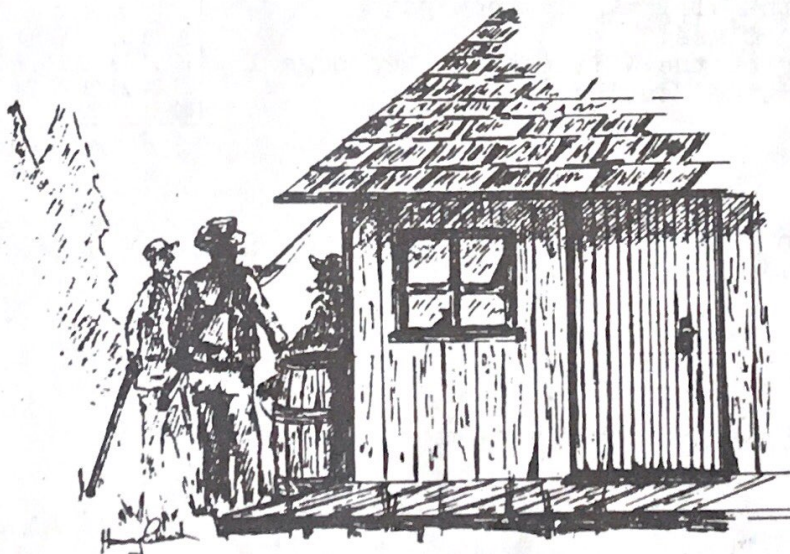
TWC #3

- 1 Tie on ginger hackle at head of hook
2 Dub on hare's ear and wind a fuzzy body
3 Palmer body with ginger hackle
4 Trim top and bottom of palmered hackle
5 Roll on turkey quill wing and trim to desired length
6 Take two or three turns of dubbed hare's ear to form fuzzy head and whip finish



I use this variation on quiet, glassy water when the fish tend to be ultra-selective.

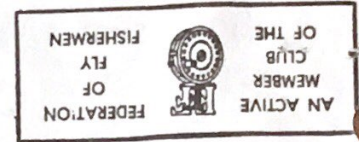
In general, I found that a size #16 94840 standard dry fly hook was adequate for most situations, however, the fly is readily adaptable to any size needed for existing fishing conditions. Also, I should note that the turkey quill wing which is rolled on in tent-shaped fashion should be first treated with vinyl cement for added durability. All of these patterns are very easy to tie and with a little practice should take only a few minutes. I would recommend a good floatant such as Gehrke's Gink when fishing them to obtain added buoyancy. Tie up a few and try them, I don't think that you'll be disappointed.
