
## THE FIRST ORVIS FLY REEL

Many fly fishermen are the proud owners of Orvis "CFO" fly reels. However, the grandfather of the present-day "CFO" reel was the Orvis 1874 Patent "Trout" reel.

In 1874, the Orvis "Trout" reel was considered a major breakthrough in reel design - basically for three reasons: (1) The reel was very narrow in comparison to most fly reels of the time. This allowed for the rapid winding of the fly line. (2) The reel had perforations on the side plates. This lightened the reel considerably and allowed air to circulate through the line that was stored on the reel. As the Orvis patent, dated May 12, 1874, stated, "A current of air is continually forcing itself through the wound-up line, and all mildew and rot thereby avoided, as under these circumstances the line soon becomes throughly dried." (3) The narrow Orvis reel was one of the first fly reels to be mounted on the rod handle in the manner they are now mounted today (hanging vertically down) - prior to the Orvis reel, most fly reels were mounted on the rod "sideways" like our contemporary automatic reels.

The Orvis 1874 Patent "Trout" reel was made of nickel-plated brass and sold for \$2.50. The reel was stamped "C.F. ORVIS MAKER, PATENTED MAY 12th 1874, MANCHESTER VT" and came in a dark walnut case. The 1874 Orvis reel did not have a click. However, in 1875, at the suggestion of Charles Hallock (editor of Forest and Stream), a click was added. The reel was produced until approximately 1915.

Today, the Orvis 1874 Patent reel is considered, by collectors, to be one of the most scarce and sought-after American fly reels.



### SALMON FISHING ON THE PENOBSCOT

At a CFFA meeting last winter, I listened to a program about Atlantic Salmon Fishing. I had never seriously considered salmon fishing, thinking it too expensive and exotic - great stuff for fantasies though. After the program, however, I realized that a trip to the Penobscot River in Maine was very feasible. I called my brother, with visions of salmon dancing in my head, and we planned a trip for the first weekend in June.

Upon arriving on Thursday night, we found the campground and set up camp. The owner of the campground gave us directions to the river and we managed to get in a hour of fishing. The rotation pools were crowded and we were anxious to fish so we fished in between the rotation pools with Cossebooms and Thunder & Lightnings. We did not have any luck but we got the "lay of the land" and also saw a salmon caught which buoyed our spirits for the next day.

On Friday we decided our best bet was the first rotation pool below the Veazie Dam. We arrived there early and were surprised to see ten or so rods in the rack already. People arrive at the good rotation pools at 4 A.M. in order to get their rod in the rack first. They feel that the first few fishermen of the day through a pool stand a good chance to catch a salmon that has moved up during the night. That theory seems to be a valid one if you have the intestinal fortitude to get up that early.

Many people do not like the idea of rotation fishing but I found it enjoyable. At the particular pool we fished there was a long board with wooden pegs in it that served to hold the fly rods. One simply put his rod at the end and waited his turn. The waits on weekdays are usually 1-2 hours and on the weekends much longer. While you wait there is no shortage of conversation and "war stories". Most of the people return to the pool day after day and as a result everyone gets to know everybody else and quite a feeling of comaraderie builds up.

If a fish was hooked, the scene represented a Chinese fire drill. People run for nets or scramble over the side of the hill to get a front row seat. The person playing the fish gets all kinds of advise most of it conflictory. However, having someone net your salmon is a big help and greatly appreciated during the heat of the battle.

The pool that we fished was not really a pool at all but a long slick just upstream of some rapids. These areas are very productive since the salmon tend to hold there.

When your turn comes to fish, you get twenty to thirty feet behind the person in front of you and maintain that distance fishing downstream. Theoretically, one is supposed to take a cast and then a step and so on. It doesn't work that way. There is usually one hot area of every pool where most of the salmon are caught. When a fisherman gets to that spot he will take his time passing through. If some one is particularly slow he can be assured that it will be brought to his attention.

The first two times I worked my way down through the pool, the fellow in back of me caught a salmon. The third time through, late on Friday afternoon, I tied on a Silver Doctor. As I came into the "hot area" the fisherman in front of me indicated that a salmon rolled just upstream of him. I cast out quartering downstream and mended my line. As the fly approached the crucial area, I saw a silver torpedo go through the water and smash my fly. What happened next was a result of shock. I had my fly line in my left hand as I raised the rod and set the hook. It wasn't long before the salmon took off on a very powerful run towards Bangor. Being a trout fisherman my whole life I was still holding onto the fly line with my left hand and received a rather nasty rope burn on that hand for my trouble. I won't make that mistake again. I finally got on the reel and after an adrenalin pumping fight finally got the salmon into the net. The fish weighed  $10\frac{1}{2}$  lbs. and was 30" - not bad for my first full day salmon fishing. As it turned out that was the one and only salmon of the trip. One reason for this I'm sure is that the long waits on the weekends did not allow much fishing time.

For those of you who might be planning a trip, early June was a peak time last year in the Bangor/Brewer area. The number one fly according to local experts and my own observation was the Thunder & Lightning. However, salmon fishing is largely luck and many say the fly makes little difference — being in the right spot at the right time is the crucial factor. The rods used are usually graphite in the  $8\frac{1}{2}$  to 9 foot range with line weights of 8 or 9 the most popular. With Atlantic Salmon Fishing so close and affordable, you owe it to yourself to give it a try ... and get on the reel as soon as possible!



# Banquet Directions


