FLY OF THE MONTH

THE PARTRIDGE CADDIS PUPA (Schwiebert)

Reprinted from the May,1983 newsletter of the Ozark Flyfishers of St. Louis, Missouri

THREAD: Black

HOOK: #14 and 16,1X fine, Mustad #94840 or equivalent.

BODY: Dark Brown fur (Beaver-underfur from back) or dyed Muskrat, Otter,

etc.

HACKLE: Brown partridge breast feather.

Attach thread behind eye and wind to a point about midway down hookshank. Spin on fur dubbing and build up a fat little body on forward half of hookshank (rear half is left bare on this tie). Attach partridge hackle behind head position, tying it in by the butt stem with concave side facing bend of hook. Wind one or two (at the most) turns of hackle and tie off. Hackle tips should extend to near point of hook, so choose your hackles according to hook size. Form head, whip finish and cement.

This fly was designed by Ernie Schwiebert and is another pattern I consider a "Genius Tie." In order to earn this title it must be effective on the stream and utilize maximum simplicity in construction. Both these tests are passed easily by the Partridge Caddis Pupa. The bare, unadorned rear 1/2 shank causes this fly to hang in the water in a vertical position...about like a caddis pupa rising in the water to escape its shuck. Tied on a 1X fine wire hook as recommended, it will never sink very far and can be fished (during a caddis hatch) almost like a dry fly...strike when you see the swirl. This pattern will by far outfish any dry fly during a caddis hatch; most of the rises and swirls you see at that time are to the pupa, not the adult. Tie it to 4X or 5X tippet and fish it free-drift or twitched (or both on the same retrieve).


