
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### UNTANGLING ANGLING




# Banquet Directions



The 13th annual CFFA Banquet will be held at the former Grantmoor Hotel (now the Sphinx Temple) located adjacent to Two Guys Department Store on the northbound lane of the Berlin Farnpike in Newington.

From Hartford: Take I-91 south to the Rt. 15-Berlin Turnpike exit. Travel south on the Turnpike approximately 5.8 miles. Two Guys and a Grantmoor sign will be seen on the other side of the road. Make a U-turn at the next light and drive into the Grantmoor entrance.

From Berlin:Traveling north on the Berlin Turnpike from Berlin, the Grantmoor will be on your right, just past Two Guys, approximately 2.8 miles north of the Rt. 72 junction.

- Dad to young son after dinner: "By the way, Johnny, were the fish we had, rising trout?"


Son: "Yep."

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### 1983 JUNIOR CONSERVATION CAMP

This year the Connecticut Fly Fisherman's Association will sponsor one youth in order that he may attend a one-week Junior Conservation Camp held at Camp Workcoeman in New Hartford, Connecticut, during the month of August.

The Junior Conservation Camp gives boys twelve through fourteen years of age an opportunity to gain education in the proper use of our natural resources, the safe use of firearms, woodsmanship, fly fishing, fly tying, camping, boat safety, archery, skeet shooting and more. All the training comes from experienced and well-trained instructors.

The Connecticut Wildlife Federation developed the conservation camp program. The camp staff is composed of well-qualified adults from throughout the state who donate their time and talents to this worthwhile project. There is one counselor for every ten boys.

This year, the tuition is projected to be approximately \$ 125.00 CFFA will provide <u>full tuition</u> for the one boy that it sponsors. The tuition includes health and accident insurance, buses for various field trips, and all instructional materials needed for the week.

Any boy between the age of twelve and fourteen, in the immediate family of a CFFA member, is eligible to be sponsored by CFFA. The full tuition will be awarded as a result of a random drawing conducted in April. To qualify for the drawing, please submit the following information by April 1, 1983: (1) Name of adult CFFA member. (2) Name and age of youth. (3) Address and telephone number. Forward information to: CFFA Conservation Camp Sponsor Program, P.O. Box 18365, East Hartford, Connecticut 06118.
