

THOUGHTS OF FLY TYING

A few months ago I said "yes" to an invitation to go out and join some newly found friends, to tie some trout flies. The invitation had been extended several times, but I had always been too busy. That night, after chores, I gathered my stuff and went to Degen's Den. Turns out, it was a very delightful experience. I thoroughly enjoyed the evening and came away with ten Gold Ribbed Hare's Ears size thirteen.

I came away with much more than that, however. Something occurred to me as I was returning home that evening. Here it is. Most fly tyers will agree they enjoy watching somebody tie flies, whether it's the Ted Neimeyers or the Poul Jorgensensens or Leo Leggitt or Paul Beaudreau or me. And one of the reasons it that no two tyers tie exactly alike. We all accomplish the same basic end (a hand tied fly), but each in his own individual way. That individualism is what makes you the artist. Your technique in accomplishing the various ties of a fly is something which you acquire as you go along. Some of us get it, therefirst time and there need repetition (as II do). All at tyers will recommend repetition (basic recommend repetition) of the content of the commend repetition of the content of the co

When I first began to tie trout flies I was fortunate to have a local pro who volunteered to criticise my work. I learned a lot from what he offered as remedies. Many times I 'ye been observing a tier and he does a maneuver which I'd been trying to do for some time and never could do it just right othere it was. I 'ye pften asked a tier to repeat that step in the tie. One of the biggest things I've found in my tying is that you must plan in advance the steps necessary to build the pattern plus have the material prepared prior to starting the tie and local pro

For a very long time prior to twenty years ago there were provably some 400 patterns of trout flies including wets, dries, bucktails and streamers. Many of those are still used today at The field has mushroomed, however, MO because of the tyers adesire to develop a "magic" or "special" fly. Today "Nymphs and Other Things" of East Windsor boasts of a computerized fly file listing of 9,300 patterns, which include trout flies, salmon flies, steelhead flies and salt water flies.

I've always considered of the thing the hoody to my sport. The fishing with those flies is my sport I like a all maspects of each. My appreciation of fly thing and casting encourages me to take the example of my friends who have shared it with others. So if you have nt tried tying your own flies, think about it more seriously, especially after you've snapped off your last number seventeen Blue Winged Olive in the middle of a feeding frenzy. For the price of one, your could have tied a dozen, or more.


