





The following article was printed in the newsletter of the Orange County Fly Fishers Club, Inc. of Fullerton, CA.

ALL YOU EVER WANTED to know about LEADERS AND TIPPETS...and then sum!

A leader is used to separate the heavy fly line from the fly. It tapers or reduces in diameter from the butt end than attaches to the fly-line, to the tippet, or small end, that attaches to the fly. It is made of monofilament. As the fly-line turns over it transmits energy through the tapered leader. This energy will turn the leader completely over and will lay the fly out at the end of the cast.

Machine made leaders taper from a heavy butt to a fine tippet end. They are knotless. They are tapered by extruding the nylon at a constantly changing diameter. I recommend this type when you are fishing in waters filled with foreign matter and moss. A knotted (hand tied) leader will pick up a lot of trash under these conditions. This can cost you a nice fish if it builds up too heavy during the battle.

A leaded leader can be useful when fast water tends to keep your fly off the bottom. Thin plio-bond with MEK and stir in some fine powdered lead. Paint several coats of this mixture on a manufactured 6' leader. Leave the tippet section bare.

Knotted leaders are popular and generally preferable as they are better able to properly present the fly to the quarry. Each section of a knotted leader has the ability to transmit the needed energy to turn the following section over. In assembling a knotted leader generally 60% is made with stiff, heavy monofilament, 20% is tapered with lighter but still stiff mono and the last 20% is made of soft, fine and limp material.

The butt end diameter of a leader should be roughly 65 to 85% of the diameter of the tip of the fly line. Measure all leader material with a micrometer as you can't depend on the manufacturer's attested poundages and diameters.

Tapered leaders usually drop one, two or three thousandths of an inch per section. Sections are joined by tying blood (barrel) knots together. When dropping over three thousandths use a Stu Apt blood knot. (Double the lighter section and then tie the regular bloot knot.) Use three to four turns in forming a blood knot in heavy mono and five or six turns in light material. If any part of the leader lacks the size or rigidity to turn the following section over, the leader will capsize or fold back on itself at that point.

Leaders can be assembled so more than one fly can be attached. Leave a six to twelve inch tail at the blood knot that is located where the extra fly is to be tied. Use the heavier material being tied together at the knot. Multiple flies should be separated from twenty-four to thirty-six inches apart.
