

WINTER PASTIME


Winter is here. The streams, ponds and lakes are frozen over. Avid fly fishers spend the time tying creations for the spring thaw. Even the truly dedicated tyer reaches the point where with bleary eyes and aching back he throws his arms up in despair and stalks away from the tying bench to search for a winter diversion. A pastime must be found to satisfy the fishing urge.

Most are turning to ice fishing but find it lacks the finesse of a well cast line. Rumors of the self heated ice breaking fly line appear to be a technical dead end. Fishing in your son's aquarium, with fine leaders and microscopic midges, for junior's prize Golden Platy only brings agonizing cries from your offspring. Slumping in your recliner after a tying session, you dream of tight lines during the eternal season of M*A*S*H* reruns. Despair fills your heart. Will spring ever come?

But wait!! There is hope in many homes! There exists a creature which has habits similar to the trout. A creature that is cunning and selective. A creature that will run with the line or roll with the best trout. A creature whose habitat duplicates tight casting areas. I speak of the denizen of the den; Felis catus, the household cat. Yes, you're right, cat fishing—not to be confused with fishing for catfish. One of these land trout can provide hours of diversion to survive the winter.

Equipment

In this type of fishing everyone gets to be a Lee Wulff, casting without a rod. You can even go one further and cast without a reel! Your basic piece of equipment will be your line. Since water is not involved, floating or sinking makes no difference. Be sure not to use your brand new Cortland. Use a retired line. You may fantasize yourself as Izaak Walton using rustic twine or laces. This line should be about 1/8 " wide and at least 72 " long. Any connections should be made with the nail knot. Tapered leaders are not necessary. As a matter of fact, no leaders are necessary. The end of the line is directly attached to the fly (two types to be discussed shortly).




Casting

The basic casting position is with the right hand holding the line about 24" from the fly. The left hand holds the open end. The right forearm and hand provide the back and forth momentum. When the appropriate amount of line has been fed out, release your right hand and the fly will settle on target. Your left hand can follow the line to provide the extra reach. Releasing your left hand will usually cause the fly and line to sail beyond your casting point, hitting bystanders. Also, watch your back cast. A back cast that destroys the family Ming vase will put you and your prey out in the cold.

The roll cast takes a bit of practise but is very handy for getting the fly up off the floor when your bottom is hopelessly stuck in your favorite chair.

Trolling, as usual, is done on the move. When trolling, your line follows behind and to the side. The open line end should be held firmly in hand or secured in your belt. Trolling to the toilet or the fridge will result in many strikes from the cat living in your home.

Flaying is another effective technique that is successful with cats but is not recommended for the streams. If a lunker fails to show interest in the fly, the fly should be repeatedly cast to the head until a strike is received. Flaying can be quite exhausting and may also cause your quarry to



Flies

To date two standard flies are in use. The mouse which is fished like a streamer, and the bird which is fished like a dry.

To tie the mouse start with a sock. Stuff the toe of the sock with another sock or cloth forming an oval shape about 3" maximum. Tie the oval off. The remaining sock forms a tail. Premade mice are available and can be immediately attached to the line at the nose. (See illustration) Cast the mouse out, putting a slight twitch in the line, and retrieve. You may not get a strike until the mouse just passes out of the cat's vision-but be ready.

The bird fly is tied with pheasant or grouse tail feathers. Two feathers are tied together in a V configuration. Two other feathers are tied at the V's point, forming a body. (See illustration) A lunker cat will always make short work of a bird. A twitch in the line gives good results. When your trophy is holding in a difficult position, you can perch on the arm of a chair dapping the bird. Just like poking a rod through the brush to fish a pool.

Please note the absence of hooks on these patterns. A truly catch and release sport.

A final word of caution. Once a cat hooks your fly care must be taken when landing it. Do not try to tail a cat or you may get ten of its hooks in your forearm. There is nothing more embarrassing than displaying your trophy while it feeds on your arm.

Following these basics you will hopefully have an exhilarating indoor fishing session.
