SHAD ON THE FLY

About this time last year Lionel MacDonald invited me Connecticut River in Holyoke to fly fish for Shad. I didn to say yes, and started to assemble the recommended gear and of the recommended flies. The outfit would be a 9 ft. for a line, sinking line 1% leader (about 7 ft., I think), weighted 1 and a dropper for attaching one or more split shot. I also intende to bring my 6 wt. outfit.

The recommended fly was a simple tapered body wound of a lead-wrapped gold hook (Mustad 92608, #4, 6, 8). Gold tinsel ribbing and a short white wing are optional. It makes a prettier fly, but the Shad probably don't care. I personally used # 4 and 6 hooks and still have most of the #8 hooks I bought. This fly could be tied in any suitable color, but the color of choice last year was Chartreuse-a very visible yellow-green. There are many yarns and threads that look like they may be chartreuse, but only one color is right. I'll put a sample on the bulletin board for the April meeting The material I finally used was chartreuse Glo-Bug yarn. I wasn't able to dub it, so I made thin strands and wound it on like yarn. It makes a nice fly, and seemed to work with or without tinsel and wing.

On Monday, May 20th, we left early enough to arrive at the South Hadley side of the Rt. 116 bridge at about 8 AM. We parked in a lot at the end of the bridge, rigged our gear, and went down the bank and under the bridge to the river. (Helpful hint-do not leave expensive fishing gear exposed to view in your parked car. We didn't have trouble, but cars have been broken into.)

As we approached the river I thought for a moment that we might be alone. Foolish thought. At the bank it was obvious that most trees had someone standing in the water on the other side of them. It wasn't overcrowded though, and the people were friendly. Several traded places with us so that we could have better spots to roll cast from. Even though everyone else was spin fishing, several of them fly fished for trout. Everyone was also catching Shad. As you stood knee deep on the steep bank you could see silver shad moving by all the time. Occasionally they were on the end of the line of someone upstream, most often they went by under their own power.

I started fishing with my 6 wt. outfit, with two split shot on a dropper to take the fly down in the fast current. After 15 minutes I had my first Shad on, and got it close enough to see that it was a big Roe Shad of 20+ inches. And then everything that could go wrong did! The combination of large, flat sided fish and heavy current bent my rod tip down so much that I had visions of \$200 graphite paint

stirrers, the only use I can think of for a fractured rod. I also intended to beach rather than net the fish, and I wasn't in a good spot for that. And I had tied my split shot onto the extended end of my 1X leader tippett left long at the barrel knot for that purpose. As you can guess, just as I stepped onto firm ground and started to maneuver the fish in, the leader gave at the last knot and the fish was gone. An then so was I, back to the car to get the 9 wt. outfit I should have used to begin with.

Lionel and I caught 6 to 8 fish each that morning, most of them landed and released. I still kept breaking off fish, though, and lost most of my flies before I realized that it was the extension on the last knot that was the problem. As soon as I started using a separate dropper clinch-knotted above the leader knot I stopped breaking leaders. Except, of course, for a few times when I was hung up on the bottom. I had brought a small tying kit with me, though, and was able to tie some m re flies during our lunch break.

The 9 wt. outfit with sinking line worked fine, as did chartreuse flies. The Shad seemed to hit only at the bottom of the swing, and you had to set the hook immediately, if not sooner. My fish didn't run, but seemed to use the current. It also paid off to move around. Although the fish were everywhere, people fishing from one or two spots seemed to do better.

Unfortunately, the morning provided all of our action. We only caught one more shad after lunch, while the spin fishermen kept on taking fish. The current looked faster, and most likely we simply weren't getting down deep enough. We finished our day with a trip to the Classic & Custom Fly Shop in Holyoke.

I'm looking forward to fly fishing for Shad again this year. The fish are fun to catch and the run is predictable. They're even good to eat and so far not endangered or polluted. Anyone know what the hot color will be this year?

1986 JUNIOR CONSERVATION CAMP

This year the Connecticut Fly Fishermen's Association will sponsor the attendance of one youth at a one-week Junior Conservation Camp held at Camp Workcoeman in New Hartford, Connecticut, during the month of August.

The Junior Conservation Camp gives boys twelve through fourteen years of age an opportunity to gain education in the proper use of our natural resources, the safe use of firearms, woodsmanship, fly fishing, fly tying, camping, boat safety, archery, skeet shooting and more. All the training comes from experienced and well-trained instructors.


The Connecticut Wildlife Federation developed the conservation camp program. The camp staff is composed of well-qualified adults from throughout the state who donate their time and talents to this worthwhile project. There is one counselor for every ten boys.


This year the tuition is projected to be approximately \$ 125.00. CFFA will provide <u>full tuition</u> for the one boy that it sponsors. The tuition includes health and accident insurance, buses for various field trips and all instructional materials needed for the week.

Any boy between the ages of twelve and fourteen, in the immediate family of a CFFA member, is eligible to be sponsored by CFFA. The full tuition will be awarded as a result of a random drawing conducted at the May Annual Outing. To qualify for the drawing, please submit the following information by May 1, 1986: (1) Name of adult CFFA member; (2) Name and age of youth; (3) Address and telephone number.
