
Housy News





#### Paul Kukonen's Favorites

At our January meeting Paul Kukonen mentioned three flies with which he had good results, the Cardinelle, the Mascoma and Maynard's Marvel. We were able to find patterns for the Cardinelle and the Mascoma in Joseph Bates, Jr.'s book "Streamers & Bucktails-The Big Fish Flies." Maynard's Marvel remains a mystery, and any information on it would be appreciated.

#### Cardinelle (as dressed by Paul Kukonen)

This fly was originated by Paul Kukonen and Bill Chiba, and is recommended for fresh and salt water, especially landlocks and smallmouth bass. It certainly ought to be visible to the fish!

Hook: Size 12 to 2/0, 4X or 5X long, Limerick.

Head:Fluorescent orange thread.

Body: Red or Orange fluorescent wool or yarn.

Ribbing:Optional flat or oval gold.

Underwing: Small bunch of bright orange nylon hair, a bit longer than the hook.

Overwing:Large bunch of fluorescent red marabou to make a high wing extending slightly beyond the hook.

Throat: Yellow hackle wound as a collar.

#### Mascoma Streamer (as dressed by Paul Kukonen)

This was originally a salmon fly and was adapted for trout streams. It is effective in clear water with the bronze mallard wing and in discolored water with the mallard or teal.

Hook:Size 4-10, 4X long.

Head:Black.

Tail: Very small golden pheasant crest feather, curved upward. Body: 2 or 3 layers of flat gold tinsel (to build up body).

Ribbing: Oval gold tinsel.

Throat: Very small bunch orange hackle fibers, 1/2 hook length. Wing: About 7 hairs each of yellow, blue and red polar bear or bucktail, can be mixed. Over each side a section of mallard, teal or bronze mallard wing with tips upward. All slightly longer than hook.


#### THE POLY BODY VARIANT

I began experimenting with different body materials on variant style dry flies for a couple of reasons. I could not get the quill bodies to work on flies smaller than #16, and the quills that were used on standard patterns were very brittle and hard to work with, at least for me.

In conclusion, I settled on the various poly yarns that are on the market today. The quills used on the standard patterns when coated with head cement make a realistic rather than impressionistic body. This same effect can be achieved with poly yarn. Poly yarn has some excellent qualities for tying a dry fly, and more important does not soak up water. Another reason I have selected this material is when it is twisted with hackle pliers and wound around the shank of the hook, it makes a beautiful segmented fly body. The taper of the fly body can be made thin or thick by varying the amount of poly fibers used and the amount they are twisted with the hackle pliers. This is an important feature because I have tied them in sizes down to #20 with no problem. Sometimes a sparse hackled thin tapered fly will take that selective fish. Some other important features are that the colors of poly you have to pick from are quite numerous and the material is inexpensive and almost indestructable. You can even twist two different colors together and get a bi-color segmented body. I took a 19" brown trout on the Beaverkill last June on a #14 olive and yellow poly bodied fly with a Blue Dun hackle. I, personally, use a variety of colors, but if you want to experiment with one, try the cream poly and cream hackle or cream poly body varient.



TYING INSTRUCTIONS FOR A CREAM POLY BODY VARIENT


Step. #1 - Attach cream thread at eye and secure it with six or seven wraps.

- Step #2 Tie in a quality cream . fly hackle at the eye. The hackle should extend out over the eye of the hook with the concave side facing down.
- Step #3 Tie in some cream spade hackle barbules, or about six or eight of the cream colored microfibbets that Orvis has on the market. Tie them to the hook behind the hackle and wind thread over them to the bend of the hook. To help spread the tails for better balance, take a one turn of the thread under the tail fibers and over the hook shank and pull forward.
- Step #4 Tie in several strands of cream poly yarn at the bend of the hook and wrap the thread forward over the remaining poly yarn to keep the body smooth.
- Step #5 Attach the hackle pliers to the free end of the poly yarn and make the first wrap without twisting the yarn. Twist the poly yarn with the hackle pliers as tightly as you wish now, and continue to wrap the twisted poly forward forming a neat segmented body. Tie it off leaving room for the hackle, and leave the thread here.
- Step #6 Attach hackle pliers to hackle, and spin the hackle wraps, one in back of the other, until it meets the location of the thread. Tie it down.
- Step #7 Wind the thread forward weaving it from side to side through the hackle and whip finish it at the eye.

NOTE: The hackle can be put on in the standard manner, but I prefer spinning them reverse style for better balance. The longer hackle barbules end up near the eye of the hook, and the shorter barbules end up closer to the body of the fly. When you get the correct proportions, the fly will be supported by the hackle barbules, and the tail's fibers with the hook point suspended in the air.
