

Our club balance as of July 30th was \$ 5,794.47. The membership has increased to 274, of which 29 are new members.

Most of our bitterroot trout were stocked in the Hogback Dam section of the Farmington River in early August. Some 75 larger trout will be held over for stocking in the Willi next year.

CFFA has agreed to sponsor a fund raising dinner-auction for the American Museum of Fly Fishing of Manchester, Vermont, later this Fall. The Board met with Museum representative Lyman Foss last month. The event will probably take place at Veterans' Memorial in late October. Regarding the question in the May issue of <u>Lines and Leaders</u> seeking a dressing for the Maynard's Marvel the following information may be of use.

There are two similar patterns that are named "Maynard Marvel". The dressings follow:

Maynard Marvel

Inread	Black
Tail	Red Hackle Barbules or Red Wool
Body	Embossed Silver Tinsel.
Wing	Golden Pheasant Crest feathers curving down, over which
	is a small amount of Light Blue Calf Tail.
T:	Malland Flank Conthan tind Clat

Topping Mallard Flank feather tied flat.
Throat Red Hackle Barbules, beard style.

Maynard Marvel


Thread	Black
Tail	Short red wool
Body	Flat silver tinsel
Wing	10 to 15 long golden pheasant crest feathers curving
	down.
Cheeks	Black medium wide neck feathers from a silver pheasant,
	a quarter of the length of the wing.
Eyes	Painted white with a red pupil.


This version is currently known as the Golden Marvel.

A REACTION TO OVER REACTION

Soon after Dan Record's article "The Willi" appeared in the June issue of Fly Fisherman, I was surprised and disappointed in the reaction of a few of my friends. Now that the Willi had been openly discussed in a national magazine, it seemed to them that the fate of the river would inevitably be doomed to a constant opening-day-like madhouse by fishermen from all over the Northeast. Little evidence or background information was gathered by my friends, however, the verdict had been reached.

Yes, the Willimantic was very crowded on some of those balmy 80 degree days in March and early April when the article first appeared, but the trout season hadn't opened yet in Connecticut, and the two Trout Management Areas were the only games in town. This meant fish the Willi or the Housatonic, and the latter is usually near flood stage at this time. If my friends had just waited until after "Opening Day" before passing judgment, they would have noticed that the fishing pressure was back to normal and that the crowds were gone.

I tended to take the more optimistic view of the situation, feeling that if the Willi became "over crowded", we would have good ammunition to ask the state for additional Trout Management Area waters. In fact, the state DEP gets pressure from people who want to see the Willi Trout Management Area "open" to all types of fishing - claiming that it is not being used enough by fly fishermen. Each year CFFA, in cooperation with the state, asks its members to fill out diaries for the Willimantic so that the case for continued "trout management" on the Willi can be further strengthened. It is obvious that by providing national recognition of the Willi as a prime fly-fishing stream, Dan's article will help the Willimantic River retain its present status.

I enjoy reading articles about other streams throughout the country, dreaming that someday I may fish them. Isn't it nice to be informed in this vicarious way? It would be great to be able to migrate to different streams and feel we would be accepted by other members of our fraternity and not be considered intruders.


Dan Record is an "educator". He is a secondary school physics teacher and the education chairman of our organization. He is the director of all educational activities for CFFA; which include schools and courses in fly tying, rod building, and

fly fishing. He also serves as an "instructor" for all courses and is actively involved in conservation projects on the Willi. His main objective in writing the Fly Fisherman article was to promote the pleasures of fly fishing the Willimantic and to educate the public about catch-and-release fly fishing by inviting fishermen to try it - in the Willi Trout Management Area.

The article also received the full support of the CFFA Board of Directors. People join fly-fishing clubs to expand their knowledge and thus increase their pleasure in the sport. If club members only spoke in hushed tones and didn't share information, they would be doing a disservice by creating an elitist society. Our club has been handing out maps of the Willi for years, naming pools, and publicly heralding its fine fishing. The sharing of information is "key" to the success and purpose of CFFA.

I recently met a person who came to the world of the Willi as a result of reading Dan's article. He was from Boston via a recent move from Oregon. We stopped our fishing and chatted for awhile. I gave him a favorite McKim parachute pattern and then parted - hoping to meet again at the Tarzan Pool. I find that sharing my Willi with others gives me a great deal of pleasure. After all, isn't that what fly fishing is all about?
