FROM THE VEST OF THE PRESIDENT



1987 JUNIOR CONSERVATION CAMP

This year the Connecticut Fly Fishermens' Association will sponsor the attendance of one youth at a one-week Junior Conservation Camp held at Camp Workcoeman in New Hartford, Connecticut, during the month of August.

The Junior Conservation Camp gives boys twelve through fourteen years of age an opportunity to gain education in the proper use of our natural resources, the safe use of firearms, woodsmanship, fly fishing, fly tying, camping, boat safety, archery, skeet shooting and more. All of the training comes from experienced and well-trained instructors.

The Connecticut Wildlife Federation developed the conservation camp program. The camp staff is composed of well-qualified adults from throughout the state who donate their time and talents to this worthwhile project. There is one counselor for every ten boys.


This year the tuition is approximately \$125.00. CFFA will provide full tuition for the one boy that it sponsors. The tuition includes health and accident insurance, buses for various field trips and all instructional materials needed for the week.

Entomology and the Fly Fisherman

The following books are presented in historical order, and give you a good idea of how information on american insects, and the fly patterns and techniques related to them, was developed. Much of what we know has been published quite recently. This is not a complete listing, but it will give you more than enough to get started with. My recommendation for someone who wants basic information on fishing the mayfly hatches is to start with either or both Art Flick's New Streamside Guide and Caucci and Nastasi's Comparahatch. They're inexpensive and give enough information to identify the major hatches. They are also small enough to take with you on the stream. For a really thorough bibliography look at Schwiebert's Nymphs. Many of these books are in local libraries. Remember that your library can get books for you out of state, if necessary, and that your local library card is good anywhere in Connecticut.

Preston Jennings, \underline{A} Book of Trout Flies; Derrydale Press, 1935. Crown, 1970. New York. This was the first book to relate imatitative fly patterns to specific north american insects.

* Art Flick, <u>Streamside Guide</u>, 1947; <u>New Streamside Guide</u>, Crown Publishers, Inc., New York, 1969. Recently issued in paperback. Well known guide to mayflies, gives information on hatches, classic Catskill patterns. Includes short table of insect identification info.

Vincent C. Marinaro, A Modern Dry-Fly Code, Crown Publishers, Inc., New York, 1970. Putnam, 1950.

J. Edson Leonard, Flies; Barnes, New York, 1950. Another classic book.

Ernest Schwiebert, Matching the Hatch; Mac Millan, New York 1955.

Doug Swisher, Carl Richards, <u>Selective Trout</u>; Crown Publishers, Inc., 1971, 1975. Good coverage of mayflies, caddis, stoneflies, midges and terrestrials for the entire country. Early, mid and late season. Eastern, midwestern and western differences. Tying instructions for Swisher-Richards patterns. Also wrote Fly Fishing Strategy.


Ed Koch, Fishing the Midge; Freshet Press, New York, 1972.

Ernest Schwiebert, Nymphs; Winchester Press, New York, 1973. Thorough coverage of nymphs and patterns. Detailed illustrations. Good bibliography.

* Alfred Caucci, Robert Nastasi, <u>Comparahatch</u>; Comparahatch Ltd., Henryville, PA, 1973. Detailed descriptions of mayfly emergence, including daily cycle of activity. Color plates of insects and fly patterns. PA, NY and New England emergence dates. Tying instructions for comparadums, other patterns.

Alfred Caucci, Robert Nastasi, <u>Hatches</u>; Comparanatch Ltd., New York, 1975. Revised edition, <u>Hatches II</u>, recently issued. Much more detailed coverage of work begun in Comparahatch. Emergences again for northeastern U.S.

Gerald Almy, Tying & Fishing Terrestrials; Stackpole Books, Harrisburg, P.A., 1978. Description of life cycles and tying patterns for ants, beetles, hoppers, etc. Also includes fishing techniques.
