Book Review by Jim Ottarson

Tying Bugs and Flies for Bass by A.D. Livingston, J.B. Lippincott Company, 1977, 141 pp.

Livingston states a basic philosophy common to many of us in his preface, "It's more fun to fool a fish with an artificial lure than to catch one on artificial bait, and it's even more fun if the lure was made by the angler's own hand." He goes on to state more reasons to tie flies for bass, but I think that statement sums it up pretty well.

Livingston starts his book with rather easy forms of cork bugs, then discusses bug design and methods of dressing them. Part two is all about hair bugs and part three covers streamers, bucktails and flies. Finally, there's an appendix covering tools, materials and dealers in fly fishing equipment.

This volume is almost two different books (and perhaps it should have been). The sections on cork, balsa and hair bugs are excellent. They are detailed, well written and include excellent photographs. Additionally, there are a number of creative ideas that should please even the very knowledgeable diehard.

The following articles discuss amateur fly tying competitions that were held in the Mid-Atlantic and Northeast regions. Although it is too late to enter, we thought you would like to know about them. And there's always next year.

Mid-Atlantic Fly Tying Classic

The East Jersey Chapter of T.U. and the management of the Suffern N.Y. Show sponsored an amateur fly tying competition called the Mid-Atlantic Fly Tying Classic. It is open to amateurs only, with amateurs defined as someone who has not earned more that \$1000 tying flies and who does not belong to a professional fly tying organization. There are five categories: dry fly, wet fly, nymph, streamer and salmon fly. Entrants may enter one or more categories, and tyers entering 4 of the 5 categories will be eligible for an overall prize.

The first round of judging was done by the East Jersey Chapter, by judges who did not know the identity of the tyers. Three finalists in each category must submit patterns from the final list to the manager of the Suffern Show by noon on February 28, 1987. They will also tie their final pattern under the eyes of the final judges (well known professional tyers) at the Suffern Show. There will be \$50 gift certificates for the winner in each category, and the overall winner will receive an HMH vise in addition.

SECOND ANNUAL NORTHEAST FLY TYING COMPETITION

A similar event for Northeastern fly tyers was announced in a recent issue of Fly Tyer magazine. This is sponsored by the United Fly Tyers and Eastern Fishing & Outdoor Exposition, and features seven categories. First round winners were chosen by mail, and the finalists appeared at the 11th Annual Eastern Fishing & Outdoor Exposition held at the Centrum, in Worcester.

CFFA member Gary Bogli teaches at the Timothy Edwards School in South Windsor. He submitted the following story, which was read to the students over the intercom at lunchtime.

--April 30, 1986--



The Willi took its first victim. Bobby Barros was swallowed by the current but survived to become the first member of the Wet Waders Club this year. He was later joined by Brett Silverman and Ron Tedford.

We were lucky a spinner fall was occuring, so we quickly switched to dries. After a brief instruction, the leader proved it could be done by catching a trout on his first cast. Success came first to our only female member, Traci Dreher, as she landed a wiggling dace. "How do I get him off?" She made a valiant effort but was finally aided by our now celebrity leader who was able to extract the hook from the slimy creature. Shouts or success soon came from Brett, who also landed a silver sides.

As darkness approached we had to leave the Willi with its swift current, slippery bottom and wild-flowered banks. Each member had a tale to tell about fish missed, trees caught, an arm hooked. Doug Klenke and Traci Dreher had accomplished the ultimate fear—they remained dry on the Willi.




Banquet Directions



The 17th annual CFFA Banquet will be held at the Sphinx Temple located between the Grantmoor and Bradlees on the northbound lane of the Berlin Turnpike in Newinaton.

From Hartford: Take I-91 south to the Rt. 15-Berlin Turnpike exit. Travel south on the Turnpike approximately 5.8 miles. Bradlees and a Grantmoor sign will be seen on the other side of the road. Make a U-turn at the next light and drive into the Grantmoor entrance.

From Berlin: Traveling north on the Berlin Turnpike from Berlin the Grantmoor will be on your right, just past Bradlees. This is about 2.8 miles north of the Rt.72 junction.




