The Fifty Years of the Mickey Finn

I recently had the opportunity to demonstrate to fellow members of the CFFA how I tie the "Mickey Finn": binding the bunches of red and yellow bucktail prior to attaching them to the hook. I chose that particular fly for my tying

debut because I think that the technique is not universally in use and because

the streamer is. I was attracted to the "Finn" early in my fly-flinging career simply due to its appearance, but, like people, flies become richer bathed in the light of their histories.

The Mickey Finn was actually one bucktail in a series of six ground out by William Mills & Son that enjoyed limited popularity when John Alden Knight was

introduced to it on the Mianus River early in the 1932 trout season. Four years later, Knight was invited to the Mad River Club near Toronto. These sports fished the "square tail" with small salmon flies, greased line method.

suppose all of us, at one stream or another, pressed some killer fly on our companions and so it was with Mr. Knight at Mad River. And the response was not atypical, a half-hearted acceptance. Bang! A two pounder. That day, Knight landed and released 75 fish. In the Fall of '37 "Hunting and Fishing" magazine ran Knight's story of the Mickey Finn coincident with a Webber Tackle

Ad featuring the same streamer during the New York Sportsman's Show. Within two days, not a copy was available and within a week the deed to the Fountain of Youth could not buy a patch of yellow or red bucktail. It is estimated that up to 500,000 were tied at the Sportsman's Show.

The Orvis Company has indicated that the survival rate of new flies is low in the extreme. Following a flurry of interest in the first couple of years, the

fly is discontinued with a dozen patterns persisting year after year. During the years I was in the tackle business, I can't recall one shop I visited that

did not carry a good supply of Mickey Finns, and since have encountered few streamer wallets without at least two of them. Whether fished or not, the record of this fly is remarkable.




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CROSING THE HOUSATONIC

Dam turbines had been started despite the phone recording. I
tightened the drawstring on my waders and with my new friend
within arms reach, we moved across following the best route I
knew. Thank goodness for the wading staff! It kept me on my
feet, and we kept moving. It's amazing how the bond of
friendship grows under these conditions. Then, water over
the top! We stayed on our feet, but barely. Once we grabbed
each other to stay up. Finally, we were out of deep water
and out of trouble. Shivering from the wet and cold, I
headed for my car and dry clothes. As I stowed equipment in
the trunk I heard the evening's familiar voice coming toward
me in the darkness, "How about a beer?" Over a can of Bud,
we properly introduced ourselves, and vowed "Never again!"


