
#### Directions to the Brewer House

From 1-84: Take Route 2 East to Exit 5C (Maple St.). At end of ramp (light), go right on Maple St. At next light (very short distance) go right on Main St. Proceed 3/10 mile to Brewer House/Hockanum Library. As you pass a long lighted storefront on your right ("chiropractor; Fantastic Sam's, etc.) look immediately on your left for two brick buildings. There is a sign "East Hartford Public Library Hockanum Branch." Pull into the driveway and park. The library is on the left, the Brewer House is on the right.

From Glastonbury: Proceed west on Route 2 to Exit 5C. Turn left at the end of the ramp, onto Maple St., and then right on Main Street. Proceed as above.

On Main Street from Glastonbury: Follow Main St. into East Hartford and watch for Maple St. (light) which enters from the right. Look for Brewer House 3/10 mile ahead on the left.

On Main St. from East Hartford: Follow Main St. toward Glastonbury. Remember that Main Street divides here at highway. After going under Route 2, take first left, them bear right onto Main St. There is a Sunoco station on corner just before the Hockanum Library and Brewer House.

#### PALMERS, HACKLES AND OTHER STRANGE NOTIONS

## (Reference Dick Stewart, Universal Fly Tying Guide)

The Adams is a dry fly of the imitation type. It is intended to imitate some type of insect in nature. There's a lot of discussion as to what this fly imitates. A mayfly? Caddis? Or some other type of bug. I don't have the answer to this. But I do know that this fly is very successful even if I don't understand why. If you ask the next fish you get, I suspect he would tell you that it appears to be a bug, it's alive and therefore, food.

The fly has a subdued body, variegated wing and hackle coloring, and has the classic profile and water surface footprint of a mayfly. All accepted characteristics of a successful dry fly.

This fly is universally successful on all types of water across the country. Most fishermen, if forced to use only one fly, would select this fly.

Hook: Mustad 94840, Size 10 - 20 (I prefer sizes 12 thru 16)

Thread: Black 6/0

Wing: Grizzly hackle tips

Tail: Mixed grizzly and brown hackle barbules

Body: Grey muskrat underfur Hackle: Mixed grizzly and brown

Start your thread one eye width behind the eye and wind a bed of thread for the wings. Select two feathers from your grizzly neck for the wing. You will be using the tips of these hackles. These tips should be narrow and with about four black bars in the final length. Tie these in at the foundation of thread with the tips pointing toward the eye. The wing length should be as long as the hook shank. Lift the wing up and wrap the thread in front of the clump to hold the wing up. Now divide the wings and separate with a figure 8 and reverse figure 8. This will separate them into a Vee.

Remove a few grizzly and brown barbules from the spade hackles of the necks. These unique hackles have stiffer barbules with very little webbing than the other hackles on the neck. These hackles may be found along the sides and about half way down the neck. Tie these barbules in for the tail. Tie the tail in at the rear of the shank making the tail the same length as the hook shank. Bring the thread forward wrapping down the tail over the shank. Trim the barbules such that the butts are even with the wing butts. This will result in an even base for the body.

Take a small amount of the muskrat underfur and dub this onto your thread. This thread should be waxed with your favorite dubbing wax. Start wrapping on the dubbing around the shank where you tied in the tail. Wrap the dubbing forward almost to the base of the wing making a tapered body as you go.

Pluck one hackle from each of your necks. These hackles should be selected such that the barbules are about 1 - 1/2 to two times the gap of the hook. Trim the hackle fibers, tie in the hackles and wind around the hook. I start either hackle in back of the wing, make two to three wraps in back of the wing and a couple of wraps in front of the wing. Tie off the hackle and trim the remaining portion of the hackle. Wrap the remaining hackle a couple of turns in back of the wing and a couple of turns in front of the wing. Tie off and trim. Tie off the head with a series of half-hitches or a whip finish. Then cement the head.

Except for the feather wings, this tying style is the same for most of the classical Catskill dry fly types that imitate mayflies.

#### TIPS

Before you tie in the feather wing and hackle you should remove the barbules from the end away from the tip. This is best done by using your scissors. Trim the barbules away from the stem leaving just a bit (less than the thickness of the stem) of the barbules on the stem. This will allow the thread to get a better hold of the feather and minimize the possibility of the feather from ever pulling out as you are tying or fishing the fly.

An excellent book on the Catskill dry flies is the late Art Flick's book, New Streamside Guide to Naturals and Their Imitations.


