
#### Directions:

From West: Take Route I-84 East to Exit 43 (Park Road, West Hartford Center), a left-hand exit. At the end of the ramp at light turn left onto Park Road. Go to the second light which is South Main Street. Turn right. Drive 3.3 miles through town, to Wampanoag Drive and make a left (at the sign for Northwest Catholic High School). Wampanoag Country Club is at the end of the street. Make the first right after the tennis courts.

From East: Take Route I-84 West to Exit 43 (Park Road, West Hartford Center) which is a right-hand exit. Follow directions "From West."



# An Opening Day to Remember

In the first minute of fishing on Roaring Brook - and it was roaring and fat with water Opening Day - I caught a small trout. I threw it back, fished for another three hours, and had not one more nibble! But it made no difference to me. Walking along a favorite stream in early spring was treat enough. Memories of past triumphs and failures were there.

I stepped on the rock from which my son Danny, then age 5, came rushing 16 years ago, yelling in excited terror, "Daddy, Daddy, I've caught a LOBSTER!!!" Closer inspection showed it to be a large crayfish. Of course down in New Orleans a mess of those crawdads would have been served up as a mighty sweet meal that day, but I doubt you could have convinced Danny that people would actually want to eat one.

Upstream from there I fished a stretch where, on another cloudy day, I was certain I had come face to fin with the largest fish of my life. A glistening hump undulated in the pool six feet ahead of me. I was shaking as I got ready to cast to the spot, and suddenly the largest-fish-of-my-life (surely a confused salmon) turned into a beaver, swimming right toward me with a tender branch in its mouth. We respected each other's privacy but spent a minute inspecting one another before parting. "Good God," I thought, "they used to make HATS out of your KIN." The beaver shot back lower-order mammalian thoughts at me, but I could not understand them.

Downstream later in the day, hoping that the dripping trees I kept brushing against harbored no ticks of the

Lyme Disease variety, I reached the spot of a genuine triumph. I had been talked into taking a neighbor's visiting brother fishing. You know how it goes - the resident fisherman is thought to know all the



best spots (in reality the resident is a poor slob like you or me who just gets by, most days). Gesturing blithely toward a stretch I'd fished a week before without any success I said, "Try over there, Peter." He caught a 20 inch, two and a half pound behemoth of a trout. I can't count the number of times he thanked me during the rest of his visit. Ah fame! For a short while back in King of Prussia, PA, my name as Connecticut's premier fishguide was supreme - or so I've been told.




