
#### Gary LaFontaine Wins 1991 Arnold Gingrich Memorial Award

Gary LaFontaine was presented the Arnold Gingrich Memorial Award for writing achievement by the Federation of Fly Fishers at the 1991 National Conclave in West Yellowstone, Montana. The award is named for Arnold Gingrich, editor of Esquire Magazine until his death in 1976. Mr. Gingrich, author of classic books such as The Joys of Trout and The Well-Tempered Angler, was a devoted fly fisherman. His own works are marked by insights into the why and how of the sport and the award is given to a writer who achieves that standard of excellence.

Gary LaFontaine is the author of three acclaimed books on fly fishing: Challenge of the Trout; Caddisflies, winner of the United Fly Tyers' Book of the Year Award; and his newest work, The Dry Fly, New Angles.

David Dunne, in his syndicated "Outdoorsman" newspaper column, wrote about the author in his review of The Dry Fly: Some people march to the beat of a different drum. This man has his own orchestra. Only he could construct such a tapestry of ideas, binding everything together on a base of completely new research. The Dry Fly might well be the greatest fly fishing how-to book of all time.

Gary is a long time, well respected member of the CFFA, residing in Deer Lodge, Montana - Ed.

of the license fee increases that will keep our excellent Connecticut fishery alive and well.





#### The Fees Bill

Currently our State Legislators are using the fishermen and other sportsmen as pawns in an effort to pass the unpopular "THE FEES BILL". "THE FEES BÎLL" currently includes almost ninety pages of substantially ncreased or new fees which will ultimately affect the cost of every service you, the taxpayer, and consumer purchase. Increased fees include auto and boat registrations, licensing for nursing, doctors, teachers, lawn care, morticians, barbers, etc.

Where the chicanery comes into play is that all sportsmen are being told if they do not support "THE FEES BILL", DEP workers will be laid off and the hatcheries closed, which will affect fishing for at least three years. So they should support the entire "FEES BILL".

A better course of action would be:

- 1. Call and/or write your STATE SENATORS AND REPRESENTATIVES.
- 2. Call and/or write the LEGISLATORS on the committees this bill is assigned to.
- 3. State that you are a fisher and a voter (we hope you are).
- 4. State that you wish the portion of "THE FEES BILL" affecting fishers be considered separately from the rest of the bill.
- 5. State that you support fishing license fees being raised from nine dollars to fifteen dollars provided funds derived from the increase go directly to the affected agencies and not the GENERAL FUND where they may be used for any purpose the state sees fit.

Remember to be polite, but still keep in mind that the

people you are talking to represent you. Therefore, you should have no fear of expressing your opinion to them. If you call the listed 800 numbers ask to speak to your STATE REPRESENTATIVE or SENATOR and the committee members reviewing "THE FEES BILL." If they are not available leave a message including your opinion, name, address, telephone number; and, if you wish, a return phone call. Be sure to talk to both political parties.

Last time around "THE FEES BILL" passed the SENATE but died in the HOUSE. It will come up again any time after 15 November, 1991, so please do not delay action.

#### FLY FISHING IN GENERAL

Last year, I wrote the article "Fly Fishing in General". What I hope to do with this series of articles is to establish a new column for Lines & Leaders, and to tell you about some of my fishing (fly) excursions. I hope these articles are entertaining and enjoyable. I will try to make these articles a monthly thing. I can only hope I have the time to write.

Now that I've given my intent, it's time to get to the fun stuff. This past year, or fishing season, has been an enjoyable one. I've had the opportunity to meet some famous names in the sport we all enjoy, and to do some salt water fishing with some of the club members. Also, the largemouth bass fishing has been great this past season.

In September, Larry Johnson and I went down to Hershey, Pennsylvania, to attend the North East Council of the Federation of Fly Fishers Conclave. On the drive to Hershey, Larry and I discussed the likelihood of getting younger people involved with the club, preferably people in their late teens, early twenties. (Please let me know if you can come up with any ideas on this subject.) We finally got to the Hershey Convention Center, and checked in Friday at noon. The Conclave exhibit was open, so we walked around and took a look at the prizes that were offered for raffle. There were some very nice raffle prizes. The women's raffle prize was a blue handmade quilt. I put a couple of tickets in that raffle, hoping to win so I didn't have to buy a present for my wife, and spend more money for fly tying materials. But as luck would have it, I did have to spend money on her. The main raffle's first prize was a choice of a bamboo fly rod in a presentation case, or a shadow box of flies tyed by A.A.B.B. (A.A.B.B. stands for Attitude Adjustment Bug Builders.) These guys sat around all day and night tying flies during the Conclave. At last year's conclave, these tyers donated their best flies, put their autographs to them and mounted them into two shadow boxes, one box went to the raffle, the other was auctioned off, before Saturday's dinner.

Friday night's dinner was a buffet with a steam ship round. The food was excellent. That night Bob Clouser was awarded a certificate of achievement for instituting a size regulation on smallmouth bass in the Susquehanna River. The funny thing about the ceremony was that Bob did not like to wear a tie and sports coat. Lefty Kreh did the presentation and kept on ribbing Bob about his tie and coat.

Saturday morning we woke up about 7:30, and had a buffet style breakfast - all you can eat. The food was fantastic. One thing about the Hershey Convention Center is the great food. If you went away hungry, it was your own fault. After breakfast, we went to the exhibit hall. The programs were starting about 9:00. Larry and I decided to go to Lefty's program on salt water fly fishing. His program was informative and

entertaining. After Lefty's program, we went back to the exhibit hall and walked around some more. We were waiting for Bob Clouser's program about smallmouth bass fishing on the Susquehanna River. While looking at exhibits, I stopped by Bob Clouser's fly shop display. His son was tying his famous Clouser Crayfish pattern. Bob was across the aisle at the A.A.B.B. table, tying the same pattern. Bob is quite the character. He kept getting ribbed by Bob Popovic and Lefty Kreh, and a few zingers from Ed Koch. To watch these guys ribbing one another was great. It made you feel like you were one of them.

It was getting close to Bob Clouser's program, so off we went to the program hall. We sat down, and in came Bob Popovic and Lefty Kreh. They sat down in front. Bob was getting set up, when Lefty started the ribbing again. Bob kept on saying, "No heckling from the front row," but it did not stop. The program was informative and a lot of fun. Back to the exhibit hall to watch the A.A.B.B. fly tyers. Bob Popovic was tying salt water flies. I stayed there for 4 hours watching him tying flies. He was developing a new pattern. I saw his second fly, which was a floating mullet pattern. It was a pleasure to watch Bob tie. He has a very inventive mind. During this time, Lefty Kreh gave two life time achievement awards, one to Charley Fox and the other to George Harvey. Charley Fox came out of the hospital to receive his award. I talked to George Harvey after he received his award, and he said the best gift he got, other than this achievement award, was the thanks of youngsters for teaching them how to fly fish.




