Eastern Steelheading

What trout fishing is to the intellect, steelheading is to the gut. I have steelheaded a total of eight days, have yet to land fish One, have never been west of the Roaring Fork, but I consider myself a confirmed, if not veteran, steelheader. My introduction to the sport this year has been compact, intense, and I have had the extraordinary luck of having fished with, tied with, discussed with, and learned from experienced Pulaski guides and anglers. They are a generous lot, I found, devoted to their sport, and striving with increasing boldness to develop their fisheries resource.

Prior to my experience on (and in) the Salmon River this year, the mention of Pulaski conjured up images of 1/0 stainless steel treble hooks dressed with a halfounce of lead being heaved through the air by a mob lining litter strewn banks. Even the Fly-Only, No Kill area was a shoulder-to-shoulder proposition, I was told. For this held very little attraction. However, accidents happen, and it was in the conviviality of the New York Anglers Club, warmed by the glow of some 12-year-old, that I was persuaded by a good friend and angling companion that a float down the Salmon River with a couple of flyrods held interesting prospects.

Indeed, there are some shocking contrasts. It is startling to settle into a cedar and ash boat cradling nine feet of varnished cane and set out into roaring water only to have to duck a glob of shark hooks and lead weights dangling from overhead utility wires. I have hooked salmon, steelhead, the bottom, and a good deal of 40 pound test mono and assorted tuna tackle in the Altmar holes. But I also later encountered anglers returning to their cars with memories of released fish and a handful of this junk lost during the snagging season earlier. Attitudes are changing, and so are the regulations. Snagging time is being progressively phased out. More flyrods are poking their way along the access trails. More fish are being released, and more fish are appearing in the river. And Niagra-Mohawk is cooperating in the water control effort.


My purpose in writing this is not primarily to instruct, but to encourage. There are, however, a few things that bear mention. Accommodations range from the Motel 8 to the crudest of barracks. I stay in a place called the Sportsmans Lodge that is styled along European lodging lines, has a small fly shop in-house, and provides hot coffee at sunrise. Kent minds the store and Gary Jackson is one of two guides that specialize in fly fishing the Salmon River; Fran Verdoliva is the other that I am aware of. There are lots of places in Pulaski to get started with a generous breakfast, grab a quick lunch, or relax after a day's hard fishing and contemplate a good cut of beef.

The Log Cabin in town serves a magnificent filet.

Croakers are literally a requirement on certain stretches of the river. Croakers are iron studded (hob nailed) sandals that go on over your wader boots. I have had mine permanently attached to my rubber soled waders. You won't be allowed on the Douglaston Water without them. And by all means, carry a wading staff. Not everyone does; I saw Susanne Johnson wade a piece of water that I would not have taken a Coast Guard surf boat through. But she's an expert. I got out of serious (stupid) trouble twice by dint of a collapsible staff that I carry in a wader belt holster.

Don't leave your trout leaders behind. The rule of the day in early December was two and three pound tippet, twelve to fifteen feet, size eight and ten salmon hooks. Heavy wire! I had two low water Mustads straightened out on me. If all of this sounds a bit farfetched, consider that you will probably have additional lead attached to your leader (at least 24" from the fly).

Steelhead are insanity with fins, and there is a remarkable steelhead fishery (and rainbows, browns, Chinook, Bass, etc) a mere five hour drive from Hartford. But it is also a fishery that needs the patronage and support of informed sportsmen, particularly flyrodders, I think. This is a changed and changing river. As my friend, Craig Schulze, was quoted recently (Jan/Feb., FLY ROD & REEL), "If you haven't been here in the last three years, you've never been here."




CFFA 21st Annual Banquet February 2, 1991


