Membership is at 323.


New Club: The Northwestern Chapter of Trout Unlimited was recently formed. This TU chapter will be concentrating initially on the quality of the Naugatuck River.





"My Dad" Ernest Boutiette



refunded with your first order

I was indeed fortunate to have a Dad who was addicted to three things, hunting, fishing and five card draw poker. I learned all three at an early age. I will stick to a fishing story, as this is a fishing club. I fished with my Dad for any fish that swims in New

England from the lowly bullhead to the fighting striped bass. He was an expert in fishing for any of the above. I think that poker taught him patience because he always bragged that he had never drawn to an inside straight regardless of the size of the pot and he put this patience to use in fishing. I will write this story on fishing bass with my Dad. He taught himself plug casting in 1919 and being the only plug caster in town for many years, caught more bass over five pounds than anyone that I ever knew.

He taught myself and my two brothers plug casting in the following manner. As soon as I was old enough to hold the rod, my lessons began. We would lay out a car tire in the back yard and cast for its center, also to one swinging from a tree. I did this hour after hour after school. No fancy level wind reel; but an open face on a heavy seven foot Heddon rod. Without bragging, my Dad, myself and my two brothers became accurate enough to be professionals.

I will explain in the following story why it was necessary to be an expert at casting. We usually fished three in the boat. My Dad, as senior, took the front, I the back and one of my brothers on the oars. Although my Dad was a very serious fisherman, he made fishing fun. All our bass fishing was early morning or in the evening. All rods had the same lure on it, a top water lure called a "Pfleuger Globe," yellow with fluorescent white spots. My father caught every bass in his life on this lure. Even then, they were so little used that we had to special order them.

My Dad's first order as we started up the pond was, "don't drop the oars." He believed that every bass in the pond went into hiding if you made noise with the oars. As we started up the pond, my Dad would name a spot and cast his plug to it. I, next in line, would cast out my lure, again naming an exact spot that I was to cast to. Here is where bass fishing became fun. Heaven help the caster who took two good spots in a row. By a majority decision, this caster was put on the oars, with much friendly arguing by the culprit. We rotated positions about every fifteen minutes, if no fish were caught. Anyone catching a bass automatically took the oars. If my Dad named a spot to the right of the stump and you either hit it or went to the left of it,

on the oars; amid much razzing for his amateurish cast. No matter who missed his named spot - on the oars. If ne of us hooked a bass, and lost it, it was the najority judgement if it got off on its own or he shook it off, which all of us did if it was too small. The one who lost it arguing, good naturally, with a lot of explanations why the bass got off. If one of us hooked a good size bass, the other two were very vocal how it should be played. This was all in good fun.

We returned all bass to the water unless it was big enough to enter in our club's contest.

My Dad had two sayings that I have repeated a thousand times. The first is, "Don't laugh at a man's bait." The other, to quiet my mother who was always afraid that one of use would drown, "No fisherman ever gets in trouble or ends up in jail." My Dad was one hell of a guy.
