Several clubs go out with the state and stock fish in your streams, using live carts. This spreads out the fish so they don't dump them in at the bridges to be fished out the first week

of fishing season. Who do you think cleans up the trash left by the sides of the rivers and in the parking lots by our LOW LIFE SCUM angling brothers and sisters? Who called to have the license fees raised to keep the hatcheries open? Who tries to keep an eye out to see if damage is being done to the land next to our streams? There are some very dedicated people in the organizations I have mentioned, and they need help because so many people are too busy. Approximately 10% of the club members do all the work all the time. If you get involved, you will meet more people and have more fun at your hobby than you can ever imagine.

I hope you enjoyed this story as much as I enjoyed telling it. I will write about fishing next time - you see, I am on my way to the White River in Arkansas, going by train, looking out my window thinking, SO MANY FISH, SO LITTLE TIME.





One Rod and One Line

by Ernest Boutiette

This article will be on the evolution of fly lines in my fishing lifetime. As I look back (way back) I must write a paragraph on the finest rod that I ever owned. Not bamboo, glass or graphite; but a steel telescope rod that my Dad gave me when I was about ten years old. It was, to me, a thing of beauty. It had a reel seat and soldered on guides and was as black as coal and my most prized possession. It was a long way from the wood rods that I cut myself with ten feet of line on them. This type rod rusted easily - but not this beauty.

I must have used a quart of oil keeping this rod polished. I also acquired a small reel on which I used old black casting line. I was now in the elite of the fishing fraternity. Although I now own rods to fish anything from stripers to bluegills, I will always remember my black beauty.


I never fail to appreciate my 444SL lines. They are a thing of beauty to cast. Short or long casts on a graphite rod with little effort on my part. We are lucky today to have lines that we can fish top to bottom for anything from tarpon to bluegills. In fact, one company advertised that it builds over 100 different lines. Not so when I started fly fishing in 1946. There were only two lines available, and both in silk. One was a level and the other a double tapered. Most flyfishermen had one rod and fished everything from bass to panfish on it. I would buy the line and cut it in half so I would have two lines and the running line was 45# salt water line. I am now realizing that I built a weight forward line. Anyone who mentions the good old days, was surely not thinking of silk lines. The finish was poor and cracked easily. When this happened I used it as a wet line as it would absorb water like a sponge. As the specific gravity of the line was more than water its nature was to sink. No one ever figured a way to keep it floating over a couple of hours. This line heard choice words when it happened in the middle of a hatch. Commercial line dressings were poor and I found vaseline to be best. They had to be dried after each trip as soon as you got home. I would wrap it on a big ball of crumpled newspaper to dry. So much for the good old silk line. Nylon lines made their appearance and although stiff as a board, they stayed afloat. Amen!!!

At this time a revolutionary line was introduced to the fly fisherman. It was called a hedge line designed by Marvin Hedge. I bought one as soon as it hit the market. It was the first true weight forward line. It was comparable to our bass tapers of today. I don't exactly remember how long the front was; but 15' could be close. It had a very fine front taper building up to a bid body and then tapered to a running line. It was a dog to cast for trout because once you got it going

out, hang onto the rod, as it would almost pull the rod from your hand. I used it only for bass; but it was sure tough on the rod. At this time glass rods, true floating lines and nylon leaders appeared, and only now did I realize how poor our rods, lines and leaders had been. Oh well, ignorance was bliss.




