From the Vest of the President



I said last month that our rearing pool would be ready for the Fall fish, and it was. Unfortunately, the rearing pool is not getting renough water flow to ensure that our fish would survive, and DEP does not have the ability to

hold our fish until things get better. We're not totally out of luck for next Spring, though. DEP may be able to divert some larger fish to the Willi, and/or we can purchase some fish ourselves. Something will work out - we'll keep you posted. In the meantime, DEP will have put 300 large salmon into the Naugatuck and Shetucket Rivers by the time you read this, with the same season and regulations as last year. Give them a try, and let us know what works!

We had another successful Fly Fishing Museum Auction Dinner, thanks in large part to Ed Ruestow who did another outstanding job as dinner committee chairman. We understand that there were more people, and more money raised than last year, and that they may be looking for larger facilities next year. That's certainly a good sign in these times.

I mentioned at the October meeting that DEP is facing losses in federal funds over the next few years and is seriously looking into options for increasing revenues. The prime candidates are (1) a fish stamp (not trout stamp) which would be required in addition to a license, and would also be sold to the general public and collectors, and (2) a salt water license for anyone, including private and charter boat users, fishing the Sound from Connecticut.

Our CONNTAC group discussed both options with Fisheries staff in early October, and it now looks like DEP will go with the fish stamp this coming legislative session. The major question after "How much?" is "Where will the money go?" The original proposal was for a cost in the general area of \$5 with revenues going into a dedicated fund for operating the stamp program, habitat improvement and related DEP staff. We clearly stated that it would have to be a dedicated fund, and that if we were going to be paying more to fish, the CO problem would have to be addressed as well. This is an important issue to all of us, and we will be working closely with other organizations to make our feelings known.

It doesn't seem possible, but it is that time again. Time for the Holiday Season and our annual election of officers. I have asked Ed Fidrych, Gary Steinmiller, and Lyn Smith to serve as a nominating committee. They will contact the present officers, seek candidates for vacancies and make a



Albacore Fever

I must first tell you that I do not lie about the fish I catch; but when you read this story you will doubt the above statement.

Jerry Wade and myself spent the last week in September fishing off Watch Hill to be joined by Gary Steinmiller for two days. Gary was good luck as he brought two days of calm seas and albacore, bass and blues beyond belief. We got to the salt on Saturday morning. We quickly set up the camper in a campground and sped out to Watch Hill post haste. The sea was flat. On the way out from Stonington we passed many schools of bass and blues. Jerry would ask me if I wanted to cast to them; but all I would do is point my finger at Watch Hill. We cruised around looking for bait and found it top to bottom in shallow water off the rocks at the tip of Watch Hill. We anchored and in a few minutes hawkeyed Jerry let out the magic word, "albacore"! They were slashing into the bait. We started catching them immediately. Also caught bass and blues that were lip hooked and sent many blues south with our flies in their mouth. We must have lost a couple dozen flies that the blues cut off during the week.

I will now explain albacore fever. They hit like a ton of bricks and in a few seconds always take out 300 feet or more line on their first run. It is the strongest fish that I have ever caught. No way to stop them on this first run. You bring them back inch by inch and they hug the bottom when near the boat. It often takes as long to bring them to net as to retrieve your 300 feet of line. I disproved one theory. If I hook a fish, I want to net them. (What a concept! Ed.) So instead of a 10# leader, I used an 18½# Orvis Super Strength Tippet on a 9' leader and the albacore could care less, and instead of a small fly, I used a 2/0 White Deceiver which proved my best fly. Gary tied two flies that were very successful that he calls the Green Machine and the Smoke Machine.

Now to the part of my story that will make you believe that I tell big lies.

We were anchored when all of a sudden all hell broke loose off the tip of Watch Hill. The blues had trapped bait against the shore in a very small area and, although the sea was dead calm, the water was being churned up like in a storm. So we decided to motor over and have some fun. We had fish on at almost every cast. We often had doubles and triples. We also caught the best bass of the trip here. Quite a few of them, plus a bonus of one albacore that Gary netted. So many fish that Gary sat down, saying that his arm could take no more! Now for the unbelievable. Although the blues were still

going crazy, we **left** this area to chase albacore. This one day was one of the two most unbelievable days of fishing. We were on the water for twelve hours.

Day two was a replica of day one with one exception. While anchored and catching albacore, the blues had bait trapped again in the same place and believe it or not, we did not go fish for them. We had albacore fever.

At times, the sea was too rough to fish at Watch Hill, but we were always lucky enough to find schools of bass in the bay off Sandy Point. We caught many bass here drifting through them. I must mention here that I got the grand slam one day: bonito, albacore, bass and blue. My favorite lure on blue and bass was a 1/0 Clauser Minnow in chartreuse and white.

If you ever want to know what albacore fever is, you must fish with Jerry and Gary. They are a couple of mad men when albacore show up. Lines and flies are flying in all directions. Gary once told me that I needed a football helmet for safety at this time and he was right! I told them that if I took a video with sound when the albacore were around the boat, I would be a millionaire. The cause of this was the language and gestures that followed bent hooks, broken leaders, messed up lines coming out of the basket, break offs, etc. It was a three ring circus to just sit back and watch them. All-in-all, one heck of a trip. We could have filled the boat with bass and blues if we had just fished for them.

As I sit here writing this, I am calling myself a dummy for not fishing for them; but I know down deep that nothing will change under the same circumstances as I have caught "Bonito Fever."




