A Bittersweet Morning

Finishing breakfast, while listening to the local weatherman try to explain why the clear morning forecast the night before had failed to arrive, could only provoke one thought, "So what else is new". Actually, the weather was not that bad: clouds and a few sprinkles.

As I headed up Route 44, a brighter sky to the north indicated I might not need that rain jacket after all. Since even an early morning walk in waders during late July can be uncomfortable, to say the least. I was happy to leave the rain gear behind as I locked the truck and headed for the river.

The Farmington was in good shape, and my search for rising fish began. My favorite rod on that river in the summer is a Leonard 38H for a 4 wt. line. Its action duplicates that of a similar rode Joe D'Addario had let me use one morning on Bridge Pool of the Henryville Club's historic water. A memorable morning with a #24 black ant and 7x tippet sold me on that little 7 foot stick. At that time, Leonard was producing the Model 38H with considerable inconsistency, some taking a 4 wt. and some requiring a 5 wt. line. Joe's rod provided the gage for assuring my acquisition handled a 4 wt. line. As usual, this prized rod was with me that morning.

I took time to study several nice pieces of water I knew held trout, but nothing was showing. I had one more stop planned before surrendering to fishing a nymph upstream, but that was canceled when I saw another fisherman working his way downstream toward my destination.

Facing the inevitable, I tied a size 14 Humpy on my cut back leader as a strike indicator and a size 18 Hare's Ear on the 5x tippet tied to the eye of the Humpy. Naturally, I hoped the Humpy would attract some interest, but the water I covered first produced only two strikes on the nymph, both of which I missed.

As I approached a large, submerged rock which had produced a small brown from the upstream side on a previous trip, I worked the entire area around that rock carefully. This morning produced nothing. I then took a position on the sand immediately below the rock to fish the water above. In addition to good footing, the slack water below provides an excellent spot to land a fish if I should be so lucky.

My Humpy indicator bobbed along untouched until it was only a few feet in front of me. Just before picking up that cast, a fish rose quickly, snatched the Humpy and darted back down as I raised the rod to set the hook. This was a powerful fish, and the rod arched sharply downward. In an instant, the fish jumped straight up, clearing the water by a foot or more. This was a big brown!

I probed feeding lanes to my left and right without

I had this trout on a very short line, and when it came clear of the water my entire line and leader came up, propelled by the straightening of my little 7 footer. That jump was repeated twice more in rapid succession, each a little less in altitude but, nevertheless, clear of the water.

Somehow during the few seconds of frantic leaping I became aware that this violent action had resulted in my line looping around the tip of my rod. Before I could react, this wild fish took off on a run down and across the heaviest current. I was sure the line would tangle and snap the tippet, but the sound of my Hardy Featherweight told me otherwise. As the fish stopped and turned into the current, I could see the line still was not running true from the rod tip. My amazement concerning the line not fouling on the tip quickly turned to shock: there was no tip! The line was running from a snake guide, above which was a shattered section of cane.

Now, as this large, strong trout rested in the fast water, I surveyed my predicament. All my wishing could not restore the rod, I was tight to this brute with a heavy tippet and a large fly, but this was a barbless hook and the shattered rod beyond the snake guide could easily become entangled with the line. Also, it would not be inconceivable to have that snake guide snap loose if I exerted too much pressure. However, the "bottom line" was that I wanted to bring that fish to net to get a close look at the culprit that had so far outdueled me and done in my rod.

Once I brought the fish in close I had to endure a sickening sight. The tip of my rod had slid down the leader and there it was, sticking out the side of its mouth - a hell of a big (and expensive) toothpick!

I had moved toward shore and behind another rock, one that was out of the water and had a good piece of slack water below. The fish was brought to net, carefully, because it was much longer than the opening. I sat on the rock, removed the Humpy from the lower corner of the jaw and admired a splendid hen fish with large, intact fins and tail, beautiful coloring and no sign of hook marks on her lips. I was sure the fish was over 20 inches and laid her across the net, nose on the bow and tail well up the handle. I felt like the fisherman in "Way of a Trout" as I held her in the water and admired her as she regained strength. As she swam from my grasp, I returned to reality. It was a long walk back to the Blazer for the other tip, and it would be an interesting search for the rod maker who could duplicate the broken section!

One further element of truth arose when I returned home. The measurement of the distance that 20+ inch fish stretched on my net proved I was a typical fisherman. She was only 19 inches, and the net didn't shrink. However, it was the largest and most beautiful brown I have taken on the Farmington and it produced memories I felt should be shared. In addition, my long standing adaptation of a well-known saying "Fish Don't Break Rods, People Do", provides food for thought.

A Cheap Fishing Trip

On a cold day in January, I got a call from my fishing buddy Terp. He and his friend Chick, had 2 airplane tickets that were free and had to be used by the end of February. First they were going to the Green River, but due to very unpredictable weather conditions, they decided that instead, they would fish the White River in Arkansas, with a few side trips to the Little Red and the Spring River in Mammoth Springs. Well, I was looking for a place to go and I found out that Amtrak goes close to where they were going to be, so I got in on the trip too. (Amtrak doesn't always stop at your destination.)

I had a great time of arrival in Newport Arkansas, 5:40 am; that would not be bad if you lived there, but our cabin was a two and a half hour drive away. This didn't really present a problem, however, since there is a cab service in Newport. What did present a problem though, was that there is no telephone at the railroad station. But, as luck would have it, a very generous couple that came down to meet their sister-in-law, gave me a ride to KELLY'S Restaurant, where I was to meet Terp and Chick. At this point, let me say that these people were the first of many from the state of Arkansas, that I met on the trip. They were all wonderful and very giving of their time and warm friendship.

In the week I was there, everyday held only kindness that I was shown. Before I went on the trip, I was told not to talk much, and "they do not like Yankees or Flyfishers; they would push you out of your spot while fishing, and would not help you at all." Everyone said, "remember the movie "DELIVERANCE", that's what you're getting into." Well, all of that was B.S.; my waitress at KELLY'S Restaurant asked me why I was there. When I told her to fish, she told me right away where to get my license and where her favorite spot to fish on the Little Red River was, and exactly how to get there. This went on all week. We met other Flyfishermen on the Red River and they gave us flies and told us where to fish on the White River.

The fishing on the Little Red was poor because the water was up that day. Terp and Chick each got a few small fish, but it was impossible to wade out or get your fly down because of the high water. The air temp was 72 degrees and the water temp was 48 degrees. We fished an area called The Swinging Bridge. There is a campground and restaurant there, where we stopped and had a burger and iced tea, which were large by our standards, and only cost \$3.00!! They have an old Juke box that still works and plays 45's. The selection is just about all Elvis, but it's worth it just to see the 35 year old machine in action.

We left there, and went to Cotter, where our cabin was. The name of the place is White River Campground - it's right on the White River; you couldn't be any closer. You're 18 miles from the Dam at Bull Shoals. If you call 501-431-5311, you get a taped message on the water

release for the day. The water moves at 3 - 4 mph. depending on how many gates they open. The best fishing conditions seem to be on the weekends. During the week, the water was let go at 6:00am so if you get on the river early, and move down stream after a few hours, you could get some good fishing for a good part of the day; even during the week.

We met the people next to us and all they did was rant and rave about what great fishing they had all weekend with their guide Lonnie. They caught over 100 fish in 2 days of fishing and told us how Lonnie knew all the best spots, and we should go out at least 1 day with him. Needless to say, after 30 minutes of fishing stories and telling us how great lunch was, we hired Lonnie.

Everyone uses the same style boat down there. It is like a John Boat, only about 17' long. These boats do not sit low in the water, so when the water is down, you don't lose the prop on the rocks. You have about 32 miles of good Trout water that is cold, but you only have about 14 good spots, with 5 of them being inaccessible because of no public access. BLUE RIBBON FLIES in Mountain Home, told us where to go, with very good directions. None of the local flyfishermen told us of the same location, so when we went out on our own, we went to Rim Shoals. This was to be one of the best areas, along with Red Bud Shoals. Lonnie, our guide, was very knowledgeable on the river. He knows where the best spots for bait fishing were, so it stood to reason that the flyfishing would be good too. The man was right. He took us to 3 spots that we had not tried before, and we caught fish. Unfortunately, the water came up early that day, so fishing was not great, because it was cut short. We didn't start to fish until 9:30, so we knew that next time we had to get out early. The water was 48 degrees and doesn't get any higher than 50 degrees, because it's drawn from 125' below the top to run the generators. This river rises up about 9' when they turn on the 8 units for power. It's an awesome sight at this point. We saw very few fishermen. All but 3 were in boats, and all waved, said "Hi", inquired about our luck, and bid us a good day as we went by. There were no comments like you would get in Vermont on the Battenkill. The 3 flyfishers that we saw, stopped fishing way above us, walked behind us and were most pleasant to talk with. All were native people and happy to answer all question that we had. One last thing about our trip with Lonnie. He brings lunch, bait and will clean your fish if you like. We ate very well that day. The menu was soda, chips, roast beef sandwiches, and homemade pasta with meat sauce, kept warm in an insulated jug. For dessert was a BIG cookie. A very simple meal just like I bring myself at home. We paid \$170.00 plus tip for this day, and we all agreed it was worth every penny.

As far as flies and hatches go, we fished from February 21st - 26th and we saw size 20 Blue Wing Olives on the White and Spring Rivers. The White River is loaded with Snails, Crawfish and Sculpin. Chick was determined to use Nymphs and did manage to catch some fish using the Serendipity, in brown. I might add, only 2 Browns were caught and he got the best one on this fly. The BEST fly, the #1 fly, was a #6 WOOLY BUGGER. I know that this fly turns a lot of people off and some don't even call it flyfishing, but I do know, thanks to Terp, that it works when all else fails (it beats going fishless). The small fish rise when the water is down. You can get 8" fish on size 22 Blue Wing Olives in the afternoon, but the bigger fish, most of them being 12-16", with a couple of 18" in there, were caught on the Wooly Bugger. Bring a heavy rod. I used a 9 for 6 Sage with a sink tip; a full sinking would be better. Lonnie said the big fish rise in the spring, but there are more people on the river then. If you like to fish without crowds, this place is like heaven. It rained hard my last day, so even though the Spring River begins out of the ground in Mammoth, the water was a little dirty and up a bit. We never did find the area we were told to fish, but this was our own fault. We did poorly that day, and because of the drive we had in front of us to the Walnut Ridge train station, we left early.

The Spring River is about as big as the Henry's Fork in Ashton, Idaho. It would have great potential, if they had a "catch and release area". The weeds are loaded with Scuds, small Shrimp and Midge larva. The Blue Wing Olives were hatching then, but only 1 fish rose while I was there at the cold spring access. When I went up to road to be picked up by my fairweather fishing buddies, I saw 2 men fishing in boats who caught 4 fish in 30 minutes. I had 2 fish on and lost both of them - guess I was in the wrong spot.

There is some natural reproduction in the rivers, but mostly the fish are from the hatchery. They grow very fast and strong quick. They put in over a million fish a year in the White River, with about 100,000 being Browns. You can't keep a Brown under 16". The bigger fish are up at the Dam, so you have to fish early during the week to get a shot. We were late risers. Rainbows tend to jump, but not down there; they fight like browns instead. Maybe this has to do with the water levels - I don't know.

The train leaves Walnut Ridge, for Chicago, at 1:40 am, so my friends left me at the Hob Nob Restaurant and Motel. The police chief was on duty. He told me I could stay at the police station across the tracks from the railroad station, or I could go to the motel and he would send the night patrolman to get me. (If you can find this type of help anywhere in the East, you let me know.) It was raining, so I decided to leave my bags there and get a bite at the restaurant. A ham dinner with salad bar was \$4.95; and everyone in the restaurant, customers as well as the cook, tried to find out about the cab company. As it turned out, there is no cab service, it went out of

business about a year ago. I got a room and laid down for a while. About 12:30am the rain stopped, so I was going to pick up my bags at the police station and walk to the train station. That was not to be. As the night patrolman was a 1/2 a block away when I went outside my room. He picked me up and told me it was too cold to walk so he drove me to the station. The Captain on duty this night was a flyfisherman, so we talked about my trip. He fished for warm water fish, so I have him a Hopper and a Deer's Hair Bug, thanked him for taking care of my bags and left for home. It was a hell of a way to leave town being escorted by the police. I must say that I never met a more gracious group of people in all my travels. The cost of my share of the trip was under \$200.00. My only out-of-pocket expenses were dinner on my own three times and the motel in Walnut Ridge. A very inexpensive trip indeed; and many fond memories.







