My trip to Montana this summer provided me with many ideas for stories. This is part one and several more will


follow. As many of you know they had much snow this year out west. Also it came late in April and spring was a long time coming. A good fishing group can have a good time in any situation. During the second part of this summers trip we spent a week up in Wolf Creek Montana fishing the Missouri River, Sun River and some smaller creeks. Wolf Creek is a town of about 65 year round residents. It has two bars and a gas station. People make a difference anywhere you go. Montana is no different. My friends and I stayed at French's Motel. French's is quite old and a bit run down but is clean and

> has good beds. At the two bars in the "town" you can get all three meals. If you want pancakes that will take you all day on the river, eat them at the Oasis. For \$3.00

you will be full. They make a stream lunch for \$5.00 also. We ate most of our meals over at the Frenchmen and Me. We found the people there very friendly. It is a family run bar and the owner Tom came over to sit with us and tell us some history of the place and talk fishing. They have great burgers and he makes his own french fries. They cook a good turkey also. Tom's place has many pictures and artifacts on Railroads and Cowboys from the area. Should you go make sure you check out the baby rattler next to the front door. After you patronize a place like the Frenchmen and Me a few times you would be surprised what you may find out about local fishing. As well as where the snakes are located Tom's daughter and son-in-law had a good laugh one night when I told them where I had spent the day fishing.

In the town of Craig just before you go over the Missouri River there is a fly shop called Missouri River Trout Shop. Jerry and Chris run a great operation. They did everything to make sure our trip was a memorable one. One of their guides, Ron, was in the shop every morning. Ron told us what flies were working and where we should spend our time fishing. They fixed the place up and have been running it now for five years. Jerry's wife Karen runs the restaurant. She makes the

best apple pie I ever had but I did not tell my wife this. Also, they cut you a very big slice. I

When you get finished with your float at night, you just pull the boat out of the water at the Craig bridge. Your car is there for you. Their place is 50 ft. away and is the only place around that you can get fed at 10 P.M.. Fishermen are very lucky to have them there. This is something new they are trying and I for one hope they are successful at it. By now I am sure you know how much food means to me. We floated the river twice up stream from their shop. Water was high and only got higher as the week progressed. San Juan worms on the bottom while drifting from the boat worked very well. When we got to the different islands that the river is known for I used a woolly bugger on a sinking line. My fishing was very good using these methods. The PMDs never really got going and we only had dry fly fishing one night and it was spotty. On our third float we floated from the Deerborn Bridge to the Missouri River Inn. This float is not quite as pretty up above.




People built their houses right on the river and it takes away from the beauty of the river. Also, the fishing was not as good. We had very unstable weather the two weeks we were there. It usually is very good fishing in the rain but not this year. One last thing I want

to add about our third float is Jerry and Chris advised us against it. They told us the better fishing was from the dam down to Craig. Something I am slow to learn is to listen when a local person tells you something. Over the years many local people told me places to fish but we went to a place we read about in a magazine. We found out later that we should have done what the local person said. There are some smaller streams around the area that fish well. Most spawning for the Missouri is done in the rivers that drain into it. Check a map when you go. Never be afraid to do some walking; I have caught some very big fish after doing a bit of walking, and also had miles of river to my self. If you are looking for a place to go in Montana that is not as crowded as some of the other well-advertised spots then visit Wolf Creek and Craig. They have plenty of friendly people, many good sized trout and beautiful scenery all around you. Check out Wolf Creek and Craig Montana.

The Perfect Fly (Albacore) by Ernie Boutiette

Fly fishermen, since the first fly was cast, have looked for a fly that will take trout at any time. It is an impossibility as there are too many flies and sizes. This is not so in the ocean as a half dozen flies, tied in different sizes and colors will take stripers and blues. Not so when fishing False Albacore. They are, without a doubt, the hardest fish to get a cast into. If you do get into them, they most often will not take your fly. I will, in this article, use Jerry Wade, Gary Steinmiller and myself as three fishermen who have Albacore fever. We have tried over years to tie a fly that they will take consistently.



Over the years, we have tied many flies; but with limited success. This year is the year that we succeeded. Not we; but Jerry Wade finally did it. It was a series of events that led to the perfect fly. First Jerry and I spent a week at the ocean. We stayed in a trailer in Mystic. First Charlie Place came down for two days and he had a dozen Albacore on using a different color of crystal flash in his fly. We stored this in the back of our minds.

Next Paul Beaudreau came down for two days and he got four albacore using what I called a flash fly. A fly with much flash. Again, we stored this in our minds. The next time out we shook an Albacore and he spit up Bay Anchovies. Our luck was in as one anchovy had not been swallowed and we got a good look at its natural colors. Not the colors as written in magazines. That night, in the trailer Jerry and I tied what we thought was a perfect imitation. The next day we had only four hours to fish. We motored out to Watch Hill and no sooner got there, when a school broke next to the boat. Both lines hit the water and we both were on. Mine, a bass and Jerry's an Albacore. Next we motored to Misquamicut and there was a Bass blitz on. We did not go in as we did not want to scare the bait and besides, the dozen fly fishermen on shore would have killed us. But we got Bass fishing outside the school. We left them and headed for Napatree and on the beach was the greatest Bass blitz that we ever saw. Fish were boiling from the beach to about forty feet out. There were more than fifteen fly fishermen on shore. We used only our perfect fly and ended up with Albacore, stripers, and Blues. Even though fish were everywhere, we had to leave. Next Gary and a friend were there for two days and landed

about twenty Albacore a day on the perfect fly. Since then, friends of ours were out with guides and the same luck. An incredible fly that I named, "The Jerry Bass Flash Fly". Now, thanks to Charlie, Paul and Jerry, we have a fly that Albacore hit with abandon.

I had brought the latest edition of Saltwater Fly Fishing. It had an article in it about fishing for Albacore. I will now debunk some of these writers. The article said that eight or ten pound leaders are a must. This is not so, as we have been using 18½# Orvis Super Strong for years. We lose many flies to Blues while fishing Albacore as we never used wire. When Charlie came down, he used wire and by his count hung 16 Albacore. As Jerry and I were to fish only a few hours we put on about a two foot wire leader and still caught Albacore. I also experimented. I put on 25# Orvis and caught Albacore. As the saying goes, "Believe none of what you read." Here are two more examples. Charlie is a very innovative fisherman. The first year in Alaska, our very


experienced guide told us to use a dry line, a nine foot leader, and bright flies. We saw many Salmon on the bottom. The water we fished ran three to five feet deep and murky. Within ten minutes and no fish we put on very heavy sink tips, four feet of leader and a Purple Egg Sucking Leech. That week we were the talk of the camp as we outfished everyone. Next Charlie and I went for Pike in Canada. Neither of us had ever seen a pike. Again fishing 100% in three to five feet of water. Same story...experienced guide and we were told 9 foot leader and floating line. We bought the recommended leader at \$4.50 with only ten inches of wire on it. Eight or ten pike and wire was used up as Pike twist them. Charlie then came up with the perfect leader. Two feet of heavy leader and two feet of wire (bought at K-Mart for .99¢ per spool).

I have always said that a New England fisherman could be successful anywhere for any fish because he is used to working hard for fish. Gee Whiz!!! I forgot to write the patent for the perfect fly. Next letter to Lines and Leaders.

Original Patterns from the Bench of Paul Beaudreau

Furaztec Sculpin

Hook 3X, Size1O

Thread: Brown Tail/Body/Head: Brown Marten/Mink/Rabbit

Fins: Brown Partridge/Quail or Grouse

Gills: Red Thread

Eyes: Small artificial pearls with painted black pupils

- Mount eyes 3/16" from eye of hook.
- The tail is tied from a 1/8" wide fur strip.
- The overall length should be 1 1/2 times the body length.
- Dub 1/16" at base of tail.
- Pinch off a wooden match amount of fur with guard hairs and tie in front of dubbed section and on top of hook to 1/2 length of tail.
- Dub again 1/16" and repeat wing section four more times making each successive clump approx. 1/16" longer than the one before.
- · Put in Partridge fins, dub again, wing again.
- · Then dub a bullet shaped head.

This is a very durable and productive fly. The artificial pearls can be bought at most fabric stores for about \$1.50 for five yards.
