From the Vest of the President



We begin the new year with our fly tying round table. This is always a popular program, and an inspiration for those of us who don't spend renough time at the vise, and don't want to be

caught with empty fly boxes next spring. It is also a reminder to tie some flies for the conservation drawing.

January is also the time for our annual election of officers. As usual, the election will be the first order of business, and will take place regardless of the weather. The slate of nominees is included in this issue, and we will take nominations from the floor. I want to thank our nominating committee of Ed Fidrych, Don Rose, and Ted Rzepski for a job well done.

For those who don't already know, this will be my last year as President of CFFA. It doesn't seem like it, but it has been five years since I took over from Gary Bogli. They have been good years for CFFA and for me, but the job of president is something you take on a limited-time basis, and that time has come. I'll have more to say next month, but for now I don't want the nominating committee's report to come as a surprise for those who weren't at the last meeting.

I'm pleased that we have nominated a full slate of officers, but we still have some other important vacancies that need filling. This includes a program chairman, a publicity chairman, and unfortunately, a conservation chairman, as well. We welcomed Ray Riley aboard last month, and this month we said good-bye. The good news is that Ray has a job. The bad news is that it's not near Hartford, he's moving to Sherman.

We learned from the HFFA newsletter and some of our members that John "Moose" Bellows, past president of HFFA and current president of our FFF council, has recently undergone a quadruple bypass operation. We were shocked at the news, but pleased to hear that he was home and on the mend. He will be taking it easy for a while, though, and would probably appreciate a call or note from this friends. The work of the Fisheries Task Force continues, with a major focus on fiscal problems, and the intention to complete an action plan for this by early March. 




You can't do program evaluation this way, but there has been much feeling that fisheries has not been using its funds in the best way, and Ernie Beckwith offered this as a way to keep things moving. The main topic will no doubt be the proposal made by some saltwater and marine trade folks to abolish the salmon restoration program. I don't know where they are really headed with this, but it will not be a boring meeting. Something has to happen with Fisheries funding, though, so expect proposed legislation for some combination of resident or out-of-state fee increases, a conservation or trout stamp, or a saltwater license. More next month.

Gary Bogli is again handling the insurance raffle, and plans to send all of us some tickets before the January meeting. The prizes will be the same as last year, and you should have no trouble selling your tickets. Remember to get your receipts, stubs, and unsold tickets to Gary before the banquet. Also, remember to tie some flies for the conservation drawing. Ed Fidrych will take these and other prize donations at the January meeting or at the banquet. The Immigrant's Tale...

At last my fishing tackle had arrived, it only took 8 weeks by sea (I'll buy a travel rod next time) and as it turned out was a little on the heavy side anyway or Heaven forbid designed to present other than a sacred fly. In the UK I've more often followed in the footsteps of Walton than Skues, largely as a result of the costs involved in chasing fish adorned with "adipose" in Saxon waters.

So as a CT newcomer where do I start? A visit to the local library almost drew a blank until one of the librarians overheard my conversation with her colleague and offered me a contact name - a local rector in West Hartford. His advice started the ball rolling and I deposited 50¢ in the news stand for the Friday edition of the Hartford Courant. A whole page devoted to fishing, complete with contact numbers, reports, locations, etc., now we're getting somewhere!

Well there's no point in my experience of struggling on your own to learn the local secrets - I want to catch fish (doesn't everyone?). So how to go about enticing someone to take me fishing? OK, so most of the numbers listed are answer services, but this CFFA Hotline sounds real promising...

As everyone knows presentation is important (Hey this is just like the real thing!) as is size (better stick to small talk), (but what are they taking around here?). Let's try: "Hi, I've just arrived from the UK and would welcome some (mustn't be too greedy) information on the local fishing." Over the next couple of days I had a

few near "misses" from other sources (blah, blah, speak to so and so, blah, blah, try this place, blah, blah, I'll get back to you...).

As always the rise came when I was least prepared (I was back in the UK for a few days) and boy was it a big sucker! My wife answered the phone, I'd got a take on the Hot Line; "I'm sorry he's in the UK until next week"... "Seal fur? I'm sure the can get some for you." Mustn't lose this one, play it carefully, who knows when you might get another chance? Gently does it - pick up the phone - dial the number (Now strike hard and keep him coming before he reaches cover). "Hey is that John? I've managed to get that seal fur in ten different colors, two packets of each for only eleven bucks... (well hooked and not much of a fight either) Fishing? Hey why not (into the net), I'll meet you there...." Done it! What a beauty! My first Loud Mouthed Yank!

Post Script: What a difference it makes to go fishing with someone who knows what's going on (at least that's what he keeps telling me). Even if the fishing hasn't always lived up to its potential the good humor and comradeship has more than made up any shortfall. As a newcomer to Connecticut, I've been very pleasantly surprised at the range of fishing opportunities, especially the free access to waters (this last part is in stark contrast to the UK). Another surprise has been the introduction to the CFFA and local fishing chapters. These have really proven to be one of the most important learning grounds and I can't imagine anyone who seriously wants to catch fish not taking the time to join and attend meetings.



Spent Spinners

A soft breeze rolled off the river, swirling the aroma of sizzling burgers. Roy, "The Stream-side Gourmet," manned the spatula. "Charlie, you ready?" he asked.

"You kidding? Does a teddy bear have a cotton butt?" I replied, famished. Roy eased the juicy burger onto a fresh hard roll already stacked with the works. I bit into the tall sandwich. A river of onion, tomato and ketchup streamed down my fingers and over my wrist, to be soaked up quickly by green and black-checked flannel.

I enjoy spinner fishing almost as much as Roy's famous stream-side burgers. Spinner falls can be prolific, and when the trout are feeding, fishing is fantastic. Don't make the mistake of thinking it's easy pickings. You still must use the right color and size. A proper presentation will increase your catch immeasurably, or get you the trout of a lifetime.

When you're talking spinners, you're talking mayflies. There are many excellent books on the subject of mayflies, so I'm not going to attempt to explain their lifecycle in detail. At the end of their lives they fly out over the stream or river, copulate, lay their eggs and die. They start at about tree top level and slowly descend until they drop on the river, "spent." A tell-tale sign that this is about to happen would be birds flying erratically over the river. They enjoy feeding on spinners as much as the trout do.

Over the years I've noticed that many fly fishermen leave the river about an hour or so before dark. This is not the time to leave! The good fishing is just about to start. This is the ideal time to ready yourself for the evening's spinner fall. Change your tippet while there's still some sunlight. Select a spinner and tie it on. I often start with a small spinner, number twenty, and then change to larger ones as daylight begins to fade. I rarely tie a spinner larger than size fourteen. If I need a larger size, I imitate it on a number fourteen hook. You can always trim it. The predominant body colors are brown and yellow. Chocolate brown, medium brown, creamy yellow and yellow with a slight orange cast are good choices. I also tie some in tan, olive, and black. These I use as general patterns to imitate whatever may be on the water at any given time of the day: flying ants, midges, etc.

He was using a tan spinner, size twenty, and caught eleven trout between one and four in the afternoon. There were some tan midges on the water. My friend's spinner pattern was a perfect imitation.

As for presentation, instead of the traditional cross-stream cast and drift, try this: Assume the river is flowing from left to right. You need to make a thirty foot cast to a spinner sipping trout. Pick a target five or six feet above the rising fish and a couple of feet beyond the trout's feeding lane. Make your normal cast, but before your forward cast lands on the water, swing your rod across your body so that the rod tip points at approximately ten o'clock. Let the spinner fall on the water. As your spinner starts its downstream drift, follow it with your rod tip and begin taking up slack with your left hand. Slide the fly across the water into the trout's feeing lane with your rod tip. Continue following with your rod and picking up slack as needed. Some of your fly line and all of your leader should now be on the upstream side of your drifting spinner, drag free. From my own experience and from many conversations with other anglers, I've realized this is the most productive presentation you can make to surface feeding trout. You need to make sure that you slide the spinner into the trout's feeding lane as precisely as possible. Two or three inches either way can make a difference.

I remember an evening fishing my favorite pool on the Farmington River. I had made several casts to a rising trout without any takes. I finally got it right and slid the rusty spinner exactly into the sipping trout's feeding lane. He took it without hesitation. I set the hook. The trout bolted downstream quickly taking me into my backing. I started to follow but the huge fish broke my 7x tippet before I could move very far. Oh well! That's why it's called fishing, not catching. It's also why I keep going back to that pool.

If you're fishing the Farmington River some evening, and a light breeze sweeps through the treetops and swirls down over the Greenwoods pool, bringing the sweet scent of roasting burgers, you'll know that Roy and I are there to fish another spinner fall.
