From a Year's Frustrated Trout Journal

(subtitle: The folly and joy of stocking with too few people)

Monday Night - July 8

Weather - Hot, clammy, the showers will commence presently.

Trout Stocking Day II - what a genuine bummer. Only four active stockers showed up. With me, makes five.

Somehow or other, through the steaming afternoon, we managed to deposit about 300 fine trout into our stream, and lived to tell about it.

We were too few and for the most part too old, but we wanted to do it - so to Hell with statistics. Our premier stocker, Howard, was age 82, then came Charlie at 73, next a steadfast Jim at sixty, then I at 54, then John the younger with his wife Lee and their six year old daughter Julie (God bless John the Younger). I hardly understand why certain prime blood vessels didn't burst, nor why wholesale collapse was not the order of the day.

God determines and sets these exercises in a tumbling joke upon us. At the start of each year's stocking, with old hands and nubile new stockers listening, I stand and pontificate and give forth the implacable instructions once again (just as my Daddy did before me): "If for some reason you feel you must actually touch the trout while you are putting them into the stream, please, always, wet your hands first!!!!"

HAH!

When this day's stocking was mercifully completed, we followed Howard up the hill to his place for refreshments. His wife Elinor was there to welcome us. Blessed shade of the porch, freezing cold soda and beer, pretzels, chips, and coolers full of ice. Coolth and relaxation finally reigned, and good talk followed.

Julie, stationed on the porch hammock with a fistful of pretzels and a coke nearby, engaged me in conversation. "Know what we're having for dinner tonight?" "Pizza?" asked I. "Uh uh," said she, "lobster!!" All of us on



LOCATED ON THE THAMES RIVER

Connecticut Saltwater Flyfishing - "Accurate Access #1" Niantic River Railroad Bridge

KEY: 1. Hillyer's Tackle Shop; 2. Mijoy Charter Boat Parking; 3. Sand parking area with "Keep Out Nuclear Fallout" rocks; 4. Parking: access to west side.

DIRECTIONS: Turn left just past Hillyer's under the overpass, continue into the Mijoy parking area. Bear right at the end of lot, note dirt railroad underpass. If gate is closed (rarely), I've never been bothered parking right there. If open, drive through (the water is not usually too deep) and bear right.

Stay off sand! Stay to right and park near RR tracks.

You now have access to considerable water that flyfishes well. Sometimes the aquatic vegetation near shore is a pain, but you can get beyond it. This is not a great fishing area, but its *open all the time* and yields a few schoolies with fish to 24" (on their way to the Thames for the winter?).

The channel swings away from the shore leaving an eddy that can be good. Past the eddy is a large flat out past


the point that fishes well. It is sometimes but not always critical to reach the moving water beyond it. Sometimes you can see splashing out by the can and watch the fish moving in to you.

Large stripers frequent the railroad abutment edge but are impossible to effectively fly fish, although smaller fish can be found up to and under the bridge as well.

This area has blue fish and hickory shad as well in season, all of which are active on a moving tide. Around the corner toward Millstone is an enormous flat, too deep to wade at high tides, but at a moon low tide you can walk almost to Waterford Island to a sand bar. Occasional good fish are out here as well as the cruising school bass.

This area usually turns off completely during the day light hours - be there before the Mijoy sails for best results.

NOTE: The boat launch is first rate and enables one to reach a considerable amount of very good water.
