

Take the Kids Fishing

My last article explained what a bargain I think fishing is. It's even a better deal when you take the kids fishing. This past Fall in the month of October, I decided that it was time to take the children fishing for Hickory Shad, as I have done the last three Fall seasons. I left my fly rod home so I could work with my son, his cousin, and another friend. Three boys ages 9 and 10. I did bring along two surf rods with the thought that we may try for some Bluefish this year.

One of the best parts of a fishing trip is the ride in the car on the way to your destination. I remember rides with my father, which we still take, and my uncle who has since passed on like they happened yesterday. These were not short rides to a local pond, they lasted anywhere from 1/2 to 1 1/2 hours and I loved every minute of them.

My ride to the Niantic River with the boys departed right after school on a Friday. They were allowed to pick the radio station that we would listen to, and they could sing as loud as they wanted. Total fun the whole ride. We arrived at the Niantic River around 5:00 P.M. about one hour before dark.

My son can handle a spinning rod fine but it was a first time for his cousin and his friend. I gave them a quick lesson and their concentration was something I wish they would use more of in school. They mastered the open face spinning reel in a short time. We were using 5 and 6 foot trout rods with 4 pound

test line. The equipment was put through a true test as the Hickory Shad were in and the kids kept me hopping for the full hour helping them release their fish. I took some nice pictures of some real smiles on happy faces. The next lesson will be on how to unhook the fish so I can sit back and enjoy the session even more.

Our trip continued with a short drive to Millstone Point hoping to catch a bluefish or two. We had kept a few shad that were injured and used these for bait. This was a true adventure for each of the kids. They were given the chore of starting a campfire with just a little guidance. Their faces glowed almost as bright as the fire with pride as their effort was successful. I set up the rods with bait and we all sat back to enjoy the surroundings. It wasn't long before the drag on a reel began to sing as something had picked up the bait and began to run. I set the hook and handed over the pole

to my son. He fought the fish hard and was winning the battle until the bluefish wrapped itself around a lobster pot and parted company. The action continued and each boy fought and landed a blue. These were real choppers weighing between 12-15 pounds. Time flew by and before we knew it my watch said 10:00. We packed up and headed for the car intending to leave. We would have left had I not mentioned that I very often caught stripers under a light that hung over the water where our car was parked. I gave in to their pleading and we soon had the trout rods out of the car again. First cast striper, second cast striper, third cast striper, the action continued, I looked at my watch, 10:45 P.M. "time to call it a night" they disagreed but gave in.



A Morning With the Master

Maybe our obsession with angling can be best understood as a series of fixations. The particular fixation that overcame me this winter was the need to catch a pike on a fly. Having avoided ice fishing like the plague, I knew that my line would not touch water until spring. In the meantime, however, I could gather knowledge. And what better way to do so than by going to the source.

Now fixations have a way of dissolving timidity and emboldening the spirit. So I picked up the phone and unceremoniously asked Ernie if I could pay him a visit-quickly. I should have never doubted his response. "Tomorrow morning would be fine", he answered, sensing the desperation in my voice.

The next day was textbook New England: the weather gods were performing cryosurgery on the unwilling masses. It was quite a contrast to Ernie's home, warm and inviting. We sat down at the kitchen table where he had carefully arranged a series of his pike flies on one of the placemats. Then he described them to me: their order of construction, the necessary proportions, useful variations on the theme - in short, the stuff that is manna for fly tiers.

Our conversation then turned to fishing locations and techniques. I was trying to remember it all; the man was giving me good, solid information. But intermittently I was distracted - by the flies. What can I say? They were beautiful: long, sinuous creations formed from silky, breathable materials and anointed with the proper amounts of flash. These had, and would drive pike wild, as wild as my desire to be the one casting them to the Jurassic jaws. My spirits dropped a note when I realized that I could try to imitate the flies at my own vise, but I would never match the consummate skill of their maker.

It was, however, no time for self-reproach, because there was so much more to discuss. We entered Ernie's fly tying den where he showed me how to build pike leaders that are stronger and vastly less expensive than anything store bought ("Good for bluefish too", he explained). Then it was back to the kitchen where the topics broadened to include stripers, albacore, and other fish of our esteem. The flies, of course, were still on the table, calling, beckoning. I forced myself not to look at them.

Eventually reality intruded. I was needed at home to perform an errand. As I was leaving, Ernie picked up a sheaf of papers. "Read this when you get a chance", he said. He inserted the papers into an envelope and then -my breath was held - he scooped up the flies and tossed them in. I felt my words of thanks fail and hoped that my handshake conveyed my gratitude.

When I got home I opened the envelope. The flies tumbled out onto my kitchen table. My children, both fly tiers, examined them thoughtfully, with admiration. They know Ernie and his work. I unfolded the letter. There in his neat, precise script, was everything that I - or anyone - would need to know to catch a pike.

We never, I thought, outgrow our need for mentors. And how lucky to know one who can break the chill of winter with his kindness.

Napatree Point / Watch Hill Key. (1) Cove Edge Fly Shop (2) Lighthouse


(4) Napatree Point Rocks (5) Osprey Pole

Directions: Exit 92 off I-95 to Rte. 2 south (north goes to Foxwoods). From Rte. 2 take right onto Rte. 78, a loop road around Westerly, to where it ends on Rte. 1. Straight across Rte. 1 onto Airport Road; when it deadends, go left onto Rte. 1A toward Watch Hill. Continue all the way into town.

Parking: Almost impossible during the day except on the street, or around the bend by Hartley's Guest House. This is closer to the lighthouse fishing than the beach fishing. The free town parking area on the right isn't guarded until Be a.m. or so (it's for shopping access)—you can park from after supper until morning. Brave souls park at night way at the end by the private cabanas and are gone at daylight.

Yes, this is Rhode Island, but it's close to Connecticut, and the fishing opportunities are many. On a strong east wind, try the corner (2) where the lighthouse point meets Misquamicut Beach—bait can be trapped there. The Kitchen (3) named after the hurricane of '38-this whole area is good for school stripers, blues, and occasionally weakfish. Try a nightin June for sand eel fishing. Don't neglect the inner harbor. From the osprey pole (5) out to the point, the fishing is generally better than the first half. Fish the osprey pole area, the false point that's 50 yds. before the rocks, and the pilings near the end. Try the pond in back and the mussel bed out around the point. The rocks themselves are difficult and can be dangerous but
