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Just for the Fun of It!

Martha's Vineyard Rod & Gun Club Striped Bass Fly Rod Catch & Release Tournament ByGary Bogli

or years my buddy Bill and I have wanted to take part in this annual spring event. June 1997 was our chance. Finally the date and the winter, not too many snow days, worked in our favor. We had been planning months in advance by getting ferry reservations and securing the use of a lovely cape in Edgartown. The only other catch (besides fish) was that we agreed to paint the 20 or so screens on the very comfortable port of the cape. They took two coats and more time than we anticipated. The job went smoothly until I flipped the last screen to paint the back and hit it on the corner of the table, tearing it. The last screen, can you believe it? We did

manage to fish a few times prior to the tournament and I landed a 34" striper on my new Orville rod which was presented to me as a retirement gift. Overall, I have to admit Bill caught more.

Part of the process of scouting out this tournament is to visit the local fly shops. We chose Coops and Larry's. Both have an outstanding selection of equipment, flies and materials. Best of all, they have the knowledge and are willing to share, which is even more important. At Larry's we met "bonito" Ed Lepore, a member of CFFA. Ed is famous, or maybe more accurately, infamous as an excellent fisherman and fly tyer. He lives with his wife in a trailer in one of the campgrounds on the Vineyard all summer and fall. I'll have more to say about Ed later.

This tournament is unique in many ways: you are randomly paired with an Islander or experienced Martha's Vineyard fisherman, making it a team event; you fish from 7PM until 2AM Saturday night; everyone entered and attending the Sunday breakfast is eligible to win one of the myriad of marvelous prizes; and winners of the different categories get plaques. There are no losers - the registration fee of \$25 goes to sponsor numerous youth oriented causes on the island. There is a new twist this year, as only fish over 20" can be entered. You can only fish beaches accessible to the public and no boats may be used to get to unwadable waters. Your partner measures and records all your fish. There are three categories: most fish caught over 20", largest fish of at least 34", and single fly. In the last category you must use the same fly all night so if a blue bites you off your are done, except you may still fish for the largest.

On Saturday afternoon, 265 excited fishermen gathered at the high school and anxiously listened to see who their partner would be. This piscatorial gathering presented an amazing variety of fly fishing tee shirts which would

make an interesting pictorial essay. I was so eager that when they were reading the pairings I misunderstood and met the wrong partner. My real partner turned out to be Mark Lovewell, the fishing editor of the Vineyard Gazette. We agreed to meet later and Bill and I went off to grab a meal and make final preparations. As it turned out, Mark had not been fly fishing too long but was a genial host and brought along his very enthused 15 year old son. We headed up island to Lobsterville, along with many others, and managed to find a parking place (parking is very limited at Lobsterville.) The fishing was slow. I think I caught and released one or two fish, nothing big. About 10PM we decided to try a different spot. As we were walking to his

truck, we noticed a lot of activity. We were approached by a local constable who asked if we had seen a young boy in a canoe. It seems the boy had gone out from the beach near his home and was missing. There had been a steady southwest wind that evening, making fishing tough and canoeing even tougher.

Tragically the young man drowned. This

ragically the young man drowned. This incident has left me with a haunting memory of an otherwise wonderful evening. Our next stop was to Vineyard Haven to a beach just beyond the drawbridge on the way to Oak Bluffs. Again I picked up a couple more small fish. Unfortunately Mark had not caught any yet. After an hour or so we went on to West Chop and clambered down among the rocks, but to no

avail. Our last stop was the ferry dock at Oak Bluffs. This had been the site of the previous year's winning catch, but it wouldn't be this year. The wind was difficult and the wading even more challenging. Mark's son caught a couple and Mark finally landed one. It was not 2AM, time to quit and get some rest.

Sunday morning breakfast is served from 7AM until 10AM. Bill and I were both famished and enjoyed the hearty offerings of pancakes, eggs, bacon, juice and coffee. breakfast is put on by the high school culinary arts students. During this breakfast interlude, the banter was lively everyone sharing tales of the past evening. 1,233 bass were caught and released. The largest was 45.25 x 24.25", the most caught was 69 and the most caught on one fly was 54. Forty-two of the latter were caught by Ed Lapore on his Black Epoxy Sandeel. Incidentally, Don MacGillivray, one of the partners who caught 69, also used Ed's fly. It was a fun event and I am looking forward to doing it again this year. I thought you would be, so I asked Ed's permission and here it is:

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Instructions:

Thread:

White flat mono or other suitable white thread

Hook:

Eagle Claw 066 2x long or Mustad #2 34011

Tail:

Craft fur black over white with some flashabou in between

Body:

Clear or white EZ body or 1/4" Corsair tubing coated with epoxy, or I tried Softex and like the

outcome but don't know about the durability

Eyes:

#2 silver and black stick-on

- Attach thread and tie on white fly fur extending 1 to 1 ½" beyond the bend. Cover the hook shank if it is long enough
 to add bulk.
- 2. Add flashabou over which you tie black craft fur as in #1.
- 3. Slide tubing over shank and tie off at front, forming a head.
- 4. Color the back with a black permanent marker.
- 5. Coat body with a thin coat of epoxy or Soflex.
- 6. When dry, add eyes and a red gill line and finish with a second coat.
- 7. The upper body is colored with black permanent marker and #2 silver and black stick on eyes and a red gill line are added after one thin coat of epoxy. After the first coat dries, a second thin coat is added.

Fish it in good health and good luck!



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NOTICE

Surplus Atlantic Salmon Broodstock Shetucket and Naugatuck River Fishery

The DEP is expected to hold a public information meeting in the near future. The date has not been announced but we expect it to be some time in November 1998. At this meeting the following DEP proposed recommendations will be discussed:

- Continue stocking of all surplus domestic Atlantic salmon broodstock raised at the Kensington Hatchery in rivers that have suitable habitat and access.
- Expand angling methods to include spin fishing using a single hook artificial lure beginning in the fall of 1999.
- Designate separate areas for fly fishing and spin fishing.
- Restrict angling in salmon open areas to either fly fishing or single hook artificial lures (applicable to all species) during the fall/winter salmon season Oct 1 – Mar 31 to minimize angler conflict.
- Designate new open areas to accommodate increased angler participation and to ensure equitable opportunity for spin and fly fishers.
- In 1999, equally distribute the salmon broodstock to the fly and spin fishing areas. After 1999, the number of fish released in each area will be based on angler participation as measured by a creel survey.
- Consider options to maximize angling and catch opportunities including, but not limited to:
- 1) Delayed harvest, i.e., a catch & release period followed by a harvest period;
- 2) A season harvest limit of two fish (note: currently there is a one fish per day creel limit and no season limit).
- Consider expansion of the fishery to include selected lakes using surplus broodstock that may be available from federal hatcheries.

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




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NOV. MEETING: Fishing Local Waters - Dr. Carl Sieracki - Thu., Nov. 12
