BOOK REVIEW By Bob Hurd of the Santa Lucia Flyfishing Club in Northern California.

"Fly-Fishing with Children" by Philip Brunquell, MD Published by The Countryman Press, Woodstock Vermont



Not many would argue that fly-fishing is easier than parenting. When is the last time your rod talked back to you or refused to eat its vegetables? But, with fly-fishing as difficult as it is, how do you get to the point where you can safely stand in a trout stream with your child, fishing and sharing your love of the outdoors? Dr. Brunquell's book, "Fly-Fishing with Children," has just the information you need to get your children on the water at your side enthusiastically with a fly rod. Clearly stated, the goal of the book is: "to bring parent and child closer together in a patient, loving way; to help them share an outdoor experience and to develop an environmental ethic together."

When fishing with your children and things threaten to take a sour turn, stop and think about the analogy that you are a guide and your children are the clients. Instead of missing out on the complex relationship that can develop between you and your children, remember that successful guides are patient, don't condescend, and never fish when their clients are. Your kids are in the same position as the clients, and whether they realize it or not, their needs are the same (though they are less likely to tip). It is this kind of common sense, down-to-earth, advice that Dr. Brunquell shares in his book.

The book is well organized, always keeping mind the goals, covering orientation, tackle, knots, outings, safety, the bugs, clubs, fly-tying, disabled children, and stewardship. Orientation establishes the basic premise that the whole enterprise must be fun, while recognizing some obstacles. Subsequent chapters provide the knowledge how to deal with the obstacles. Thankfully in the chapter "Tackle Time" Dr. Brunquell doesn't advise that you buy your child that new 5-piece Sage SP fly rod. He does, though take the time to explain the needs of children when it comes to rod, reel, line, leader, and flies. Knots is equally straightforward, foregoing the forty knots listed in Lefty Kreh's "Practical Fishing Knots" and all knot tying tools for one all purpose knot: the Duncan Loop. The result is the basis for an almost nearly knotless fly-fishing method. Outings provides guidance on that first trip along with techniques for dapping, dumping, and troll-walking. Safety describes the basic hat, safety glasses and sunscreen that should be on your child whenever fishing or casting. "The Bugs," continues with the same no nonsense information on water entomology as do the remaining chapters. Lastly, "Stewardship," builds on the notion of the environmental ethic with science and activities to do with your children on the water.

Even though ostensibly a book for fly-fishing with children, "Fly-Fishing with Children," is a good reading primer for any fly fisher. The quotation in the front of the book by William G. Tapply pretty much sums it up for parents though; "the patience of the adult must exceed the attention span of the child."



LITTLE KNOWN FISHING TIPS

CAST DOWN STREAM

When stream fishing for trout and bass, remember that the bigger fish will not chase a fly cast into the current and washed rapidly down the stream. Try casting down stream with a fly that will sink to the bottom. Slowly retrieve the fly in a back and forth pattern.

SPIT ON FLIES

Strangely enough, spitting on a fly can help with fish that have a good sense of smell. The stench of hand acid is so strong it can spook a fish away from your fly. Saliva has a substance called ptyalin that is an acid neutralizer. Spitting on a fly can mask human order and possibly catch more of some fish species.

MUDDY OR STAINED WATER

When fishing for bass in muddy or stained water, try a fly with a color combination of chartreuse, yellow and red flashabou mixed in. This color combination has proven effective over the years when fished in 1' to 2' of water, which is where bass migrate to during periods of off-color water.

SPECIAL FISHERMEN

Wow, what a sight, the wind is gentle, the river is at a moderate level, the trees and overhanging brush is at it's fullest, and the fishing is looking to be good. Imagine this river to be a mountain river, just chalked full of great fishing. Now, imagine that you are 39 inches high, and in a wheelchair.

What type of obstacles do you think you may have to over come? First of all you have the terrain. How do you get to the river? Now you have the over hanging brush. How do you get through all that? Most "Walking" people think of things too, but try it from a chair with wheels. Not so easy, huh?

Well, there are fishermen, that try this everyday. And it is not just the accessibility, that they must overcome, but it is equipment, gear, and being able to use that equipment and gear.


First of all, you chair must be able to get through the terrain. Electric maybe, or a Sports Chair, which are quite mobile, and can handle just about any obstacle, except maybe rocks! Then you have mechanical adjustable rod holders, or even a special fitting on your rod, so that you can cast normally. You can get custom made rods to fit you special needs. Shorter or longer rods are available, too!

I think Float tubes were made just for us. We can float in the water and fish pretty normal, but now how do you get back in? I have a rope fixed to my tube and tie it ashore, and pull my self back in. There are single-man pontoon floats that are great for this too!

Fishing is for everyone, and that includes, the folks that cannot stand on their own two feet, or have only one arm or don't have any arms. If you want to fish, "where there is a will, there is a way." If you know of a Special Fisherman, and they can't get out as regular as you, invite them along. Yes, that fisherman, may need extra attention, but the joy you will receive from giving that attention is ten fold for what you have to do.

You may be able to get out on your own, and enjoy an early morning fishing trip, or even an early evening trip, but most challenged fishermen, cannot. They must have a partner along. I always say: Fish with a partner, you have more fun! Take a friend fishing, or even a stranger, you will have fun!

FLY TYING TIP

"Fish-Like Scales"

Many tiers have difficulty creating realistic looking "scales" on their streamers. Here's an easy way to accomplish this. After you wrap the hook shank with either gold or silver mylar, overwrap with closely butting turns of monofilament, 20-40 LB weight, depending on the size of the hook. Not only does this create an amazingly life like "scaly" look, it also increases the durability of the fly enormously.
