Masa's Fish

believe that the landing of the Lbiggest brown trout ever enticed by an artificial fly in the Esopus Creek will go unrecorded, but for this obscure report. It's a shame, too, because the behemoth was caught through serendipitous chance and celebrated in the old way-elements for a fine story. It was in November near the end of the season, in that long, deep, graceful pool just above the bridge that leads into Woodland Valley. I've known that water since I was a child--for those who don't know me, that's about fifty years. More accurately, I've shunned it for nearly that long, damned fool that I am, because my family and I tend to be elitist when it comes to picking our fishing spots.

For eons we have gone to less crowded pools and riffles on the stream, believing that the fishing near the bridge would be terrible. It's not such a bad notion, really, since the bridge, like all bridges, seems to attract legions of the unworthy. Every chump from Queensboro Boulevard to Grand Concourse who's fallen for those macho trout fishing stories in Field & Stream or Sports Afield eventually arrives at our bridge to fish for trout. They are drawn to that spot like steel filings to a magnet, largely because New York State heaves a lot of hatchery-bred trout into the waters just above and below the bridge when they stock. Word of mouth has made this common knowledge. Never underestimate the power of the word of the mouth.

They set up their beach chairs,

pull out picnic baskets and coolers (nothing like a cold one to help the fishing), and churn the pools from dawn to dusk, with an amazing assortment of lures, ocean gear, garden hackle (worms), corn and liver dangling on big pickerel hooks, rubber bass worms, and the like. Long ago we nicknamed the spot "Broadway and 42nd - Times Square," and went elsewhere on the stream for our fishing. There was another thing about Times Square that turned us off. There are summer cottages on the townside of the creek, peeking through the scrub pine and willows, with all their attendant summer distractions. Dogs vap, cats ingratiate and spray, kids ride bikes and big wheels, and parents yell--JUST the kind of things that Thoreau was intent on escaping. Me too.

What I have given you up to this point is a summer litany. In an instant--to be precise, the instant after Labor Day--things begin to change. The battered waters heal,



the hoards disappear, and soon the brown trout, the BIG brown trout down in the reservoir, start their fall spawning

run, slowly making their way up into our Catskill creeks and riversseeking their natal places to regenerate.

It was about this time of year that Jimmy Boyd finally sold the cottage right next to the bridge--the one he'd been trying to unload for the longest time. It was the one he'd placed that oddly enticing sign in front of: FOR SALE/ WATER- FRONT PROPERTY. A fellow from Manhattan bought it. I know four things about him--his name is Masa, he's Japanese, he is an artist, and he does a little fishing.

Soon after they moved in, Masa and his family were invited to a campfire potluck dinner.

The foodmakers in the family ordered him out of the kitchen in that late afternoon, because he was underfoot. To pass the time he took a big battered streamer fly that he'd found washed up on his backyard, and tied it to the monofilement line, housed in the bail of his K-Mart spinning rod's reel.

For company, he had a young boy-his nephew, also banished from the kitchen.

Masa flung his secondhand streamer into the pool and hooked a submerged log. The log began to move.



It moved slowly at first, and then faster and faster. His nephew screamed, "Uncle, uncle! You've hooked an Octopus!!!"

In fact, on his tired four pound test line, Masa had hooked a bulky 30 inch long brown trout. Without benefit of waders, with no net, he forged into the slippery pool with his heart in his throat. With the help of his nephew, he corralled the huge fish, nudging it into the shallows between two boulders. There, trembling, with adrenaline running high, he sub-

dued the beast by knocking it on the head with a handy rock.

Let us segue into the kitchen fifteen minutes later, where the fish has been lugged and eviscerated A kitchen table autopsy shows a bellyful of plump roe. The stomach itself is nearly empty. To record this miracle, the artist in Masa asserts itself. In the absence of his artist's paraphernalia which has not yet arrived, he takes a linen cloth, laves the sides of this monster trout in soy sauce (the only staining element in the house) and records the fish's image, much as Gutenberg imprinted the frontispiece of his bi-

It is in the nature of things that a man who has caught a great fish must show it to his public. Masa brought it along to the potluck campfire dinner, and after the well-deserved oohs and aahs, the noble trout was placed above the night's fire, grilled gently -- ever so slowly -- and then consumed in the moonlight, piece by piece, down to its very head, spine, and tail. The lightly smoked flesh was pink, moist and delicious. Nothing was wasted. The roe was lightly salted, rinsed, and marinated in a mix of saki and soy sauce. Then, like caviar (which it was, after all) the delicate eggs were scooped up and eaten reverently, placed on slices of cucumber, on ribs of endive, on deep fried chips of potato.

One wonders--how many other hungry people have gathered around an autumn fire down through the ages in these hills, and filled themselves with such a fine gift from the gods?

CFFA 29th Annual Banquet 20 February 1999


