The One That Got Away

"Nothing makes a fish bigger than almost being caught." - Anonymous

Gone! That instant of truth, that terrible revelation, that cruel heart stopping moment when you and the fish of your dreams suddenly and forever part; will haunt you the remainder of your days. I speak not of the willing and giving act of releasing a hard won trophy. The intentional release of a great fish, over which you hold the power of life and death, is a satisfying act. Such an act is an obvious display of your great generosity. Your sensitive and unselfish nature allows you in your undisputed victory, to simply tip your net and allow your opponent to live and fight another day. You are gregarious and civilized, thoughtful and restrained. But like a jilted lover the same goodbye is not seen through such rose colored sunglasses when it is you who has been released.

Why is it that the fish I remember most are the ones that got away? Is it possible that all the very best fish I have ever hooked have gotten away? I seem to remember some really nice fish, in fact some dandies that came to hand. I have pictures to prove it and witnesses. But somehow they don't seem as large or awe-inspiring as those merely felt, or glimpsed, or slipped just short of grasp. I suspect that those fish were the crème de la crème of fishes. True leviathans: record trout of legendary proportions. Opportunity lost. And with the passage of time my memory seems to become clearer and I can more certainly state that these were indeed monster fish and at the time of their loss I sorely underestimated their size. With each passing year and telling of the tale, my mind farther removed from the shock of loosing such trophies, I can now objectively see that these fish were far larger than I had previously thought. Now, from my vantage point in future I can, with detachment from the traumatic event, unmistakenly see that what I thought was a 5 pound trout 10 years past, was unquestionably at least 12 pounds. I can remember it so clearly now.

And you wonder; why? Why did this happen? What could I have done differently? Did I offend the gods? Sometimes the answer is cruelly obvious. A crinkled tippet, or a half a blood knot, is like a sinister finger pointing directly at you. You - the inept knot tier, the lackadaisical, too lazy to check your line for weakness, or too slow to take up the slack, you must wear your guilt for all time, chastised and burdened with the fault of losing a world record trout. Someday far in the future you will come to realize just how great a loss this was.

You might try to convince yourself that you're not to blame, that fate intervened. While this may be the case, in all probability you will eventually come to realize that you should have put a little more pressure on here, or a little less drag there and things would have worked out in your favor. You should have sharpened your hook! In all likelihood, it will eventually become apparent that had you exercised proper judgment and execution of your sport, you would have broken the state brook trout record by at least 4 pounds. You may be able to delude yourself convincingly that all was beyond your control and that fate was just giving you a taste of glory, perhaps conditioning you for something better far in the future. Consider yourself lucky if you can live with that thought when you eventually realize that no fish will ever again be as big as the one that you screwed up on.

They say it is better to have loved and lost then to never have loved at all. Maybe. But to feel that unbelievable power, to hear the reel screaming at an impossible pitch, to see that incredible girth, or unimaginable length, is to entertain the thought that this fish is your destiny. Like being in love your heart races, your senses are filled, and you start to imagine holding this prize for a photograph that will document forever your legend. Then in an instant; faster than light travels from here to the moon, the line goes slack. For another instant your mind rejects what your heart knows to be true. But the truth is still there. He's gone. He will not be back: ever. Your part in this fish is no more. Even if another angler lands him, no one will associate you with this fish. Like a lover lost, it is too late for you. No second chance: too late to turn back the clock. Forever more, each time you revisit that pool or riffle you will remember the great fish; you will suffer again the pangs of guilt and tragic loss. You can never fish that place again and not feel the regret and yes, remorse. In time you will come to realize just how great your loss was; how tragic your folly or carelessness. When you pass on from this world and your deeds are judged, you will be hard pressed to defend such a transgression. "But I was so close!" You will probably babble this mantra for all eternity in one of the outermost circles of Hell reserved for folks who are not evil or bad of heart, but yet not quite worthy of fishing in paradise.

Many years ago I asked my dad: "Why are the big ones the ones that always get away." In the same way that time makes you realize how big were the fish you lost, you also realize that your father was far wiser then you ever knew. "Because" he said," they're the ones with the power to do so."



Fall Overhaul

As November approaches, most of the fresh water fly fishing aficionados are putting away their rods and reels, with the saltwater casters not far behind. We stow our equipment in cases and tubes, to await the start of next year's season, so far away, with plenty of time to clean lines and check leaders during the winter months ahead. So why then is it that we end up scurrying around like rats in a pickle barrel the night before opening day? If we're lucky we will remember to replace worn leaders before we arrive at the stream, and not have to attempt nail knots with frostbitten fingers. That's providing we have remembered to purchase new leaders and tippet material.

I have come to a realization that all this aggravation can be easily avoided with just a little time spent at the end of the season. Instead of putting my reels away (out of sight, out of mind), I leave them out on my fly tying table. I tie every morning, so it is impossible for me to not see them and after about 3 days they annoy me so much I am forced to address the situation. It only takes a matter of minutes to clean and dress a fly line, and replace the leader if needed. Wipe out the housing and put a dab of lube on the spindle and you're set to go next spring.

Rods are even easier to put into hibernation. Just as long as they're clean and dry, you only need to check the guides and the grips. If there is a hole in the cork that needs attention you can easily patch it with a mixture of Elmer's glue and cork dust, made by filing a wine cork (we always seem to have plenty of those around.) Allow it to dry thoroughly before storing the rod in its sock and tube.

Waders can be turned inside out to air, and at the same time check the places that wear out first; the back of the heel and seams on stocking foot models, and knees, if you do a lot of stealth fishing. You don't want to find out about a leak on your first day out in February. This is also a good time to replace your laces and do any felt repair that's needed.

If you rinse your net with soapy water (Dawn is excellent) and let it dry it won't have that wonderful aroma when you pull it out of the closet next spring, unless you like that smell, in which case you can seal it in a plastic bag while it's damp. (Which reminds me, if you store gear for a friend, check his wader bag before you put it away; nuff said!)

Finally, don't forget your flies! Rust is contagious, and the foam bed of the average fly box can harbor enough moisture to ruin hooks on the whole batch. I let my boxes air out and while I'm in front of the idiot box I sort through them, remove the chewed up flies and if the hooks are not rusty they go to the "fly hospital". It's rarely necessary to add more flies, since I have far too many in each box to

After you've accomplished all of the above, you can rest assured knowing that on Opening Day your gear will be in good shape and ready to fish. Then, when you get home from the stream you can start putting away your skis and hunting gear.





