

Colorado's Fry Pan and Colorado River

Its 3:00 am, now it's 4:00, now 4:30 now 5:00, I can't sleep. That's it I get up. I have that restless night every year just before the 6 of us head out somewhere in the US for our annual 4 night and 3 day September fly fishing trip. This year we headed out to the little town of Basalt, Colorado for our too short trip, planning to hit the Frying Pan and Colorado Rivers. We would all like to stay longer but with our busy schedules the 2 days of travel and 3 days of fishing seem to be all we can seem to coordinate.

This time we were fortunate, there was a nonstop direct to Denver, and then a quick 4.5 hour drive to Basalt with only one pit stop along the way at the "Dam Brewery" located in Dillon, CO. Since two of us were driving we were restricted to non-alcoholic but we all did at minimum sample the "Dam Beer' which was pretty damn good.

Our outfitter for the trip was Frying Pan Anglers, one of two fly shops in town, the other being Taylor Creek. We chose FPA based on the reviews that we found on the web and I will say we were not disappointed.

We stayed at Taylor Creek Cabins, also found on the web and highly reviewed. This set of cabins once owned by the other fly shop in town is now owned by Frying Pan Anglers. For an added bonus, if you stay at the cabins while using guides from the FPA shop there is a discount. We had a large cabin with accommodations for 5, plus one on the pull out futon which was assigned by lots. Being in the mountains around Basalt with no neighbors and located 7 miles from the small center of town we did have a magnificent view of the night sky and the Milky Way.

Two of our days were going to be spent on the Frying Pan, a tailwater fishery flowing from Ruedi Reservoir out from the dam meandering about 12 miles loosing 3,000 feet in elevation before finally dumping into the Roaring Fork River in Basalt. The River flows were controlled at 300 cfs and did not vary the entire time we were there. 300 CFS didn't seem high compared to the Farmington but on the Frying Pan it did make the wading extremely difficult in some areas. Although there were a number of close calls, none of us took a dip the entire time we were in CO. To mix it up a bit and hopefully get into some larger fish one day was

also going to be spent on the Colorado doing a float trip covering some 8 miles just.

Each day the plan was to fish the morning, meet up at lunch swap some lies they do it again in the afternoon. Well that didn't work out, we ended up just fishing our way through the full day and met around 5 to 6 PM back at the shop then went back to the cabin for an adult beverage or two followed by dinner at the Riverside Grill where we continued to tell tall fables, each of us trying to best the last story told.

Now one more sleepless night of anticipation...

On the first day we met at the Frying Pan Anglers fly shop in Basalt, "buddied" up and met our assigned guides Cameron (who is scheduled to be do a presentation at an upcoming club meeting this winter), Mike and Harry. I paired up with Ted, and along with Mike our assigned guide headed off to the Frying Pan spending the day at a hole called "Upper Old Faithful" and that it was. Ted and I fished mostly tandem nymphs and dry droppers on 4 weight rods and pulled some 20 browns, cut bows and bows out between the 2 of us. The fish were mostly in the 10 to 14" range and had all the fight you would expect from a wild fish.

Day 2 started at the shop, we met up with the guides and then headed to the Colorado for a float trip. After a few false starts, a charity tournament forced our relocation three times to prevent over crowding, we ended up an hour away at a put in called the "Silt" where we only saw one boat outside of our group over the whole day. The fish counts were sporadic in our group ranging from a low of 1 to a high of 12 fish per man. All of the fishing was done with nymphs using 3 flies in tandem. Bob Greenstein one of the club members did pull a nice 19" bow out about a couple of hundred yards from the take out and Rick a buddy of ours from DC landed a 24" brown during the float trip. We asked about

whitefish as they seem to be the junk fish of the west and were told that there were very few on the river, 2 or 3 at most. Well, Ted Rosenkrantz another club member and I each hooked 2 with largest of the 4 measuring in at 22". Ted even managed to pull in a genuine Colorado Sucker over 20" and a decent size Chub.

The final day for the group was back on the "Pan" which we all preferred. It was also a dry fly day. Small flies size 22 to 28 on 7X tippet. Most of the fish ran 10 to 14". Gary, my brother and his buddy Rick were killing them on size 28 Adams and stopped fishing at 4 PM only because they had no more flies. Gary landed 12 fish and Rick nearly as many. Ted did better than me with about 10 fish for the day and I had a measly 5. I think that was partly my fault as I found myself just standing in the river staring at the red rock walls of the canyon just down stream. Bob and Carl spent their day up at the head of the river on the flats by the Ruedi Dam. Bob caught 3 or 4 nice fish but probably the best catch that day was Carl, who managed to land a 19" brown on 7X tippet just before calling it quits.

We ended up with a last night in town at one of the local eateries then headed back to the cabin to pack for the early morning trip back to Denver and flight to Hartford. All of us agreed the trip went off without a hitch, except for my speeding ticket on the way back to the airport but that's another story. The fish caught by all, the scenery and weather was perfect and the accommodations were top shelf. Every year wherever we have gone, we always say we are coming back but when planning the next trip we find a new destination and have never had a bad trip. Plans are already underway for our trip for next year.
