

A lone woman was preparing to launch her kayak into Nauset Marsh as Christine and I were landing our kayaks. It had been a beautiful cruise on a day of spectacular weather in autumn of 2011, but the tide was dropping fast, with a couple of hours still to go before dead low. We had just encountered water too shallow to take a full stroke without the paddle hitting bottom, and the deeper channels were even more challenging because they were rapidly draining out to sea. When I mentioned those conditions to the lone woman, she replied, "Yeah, I'll be dragging my yak at times to get back, but it should be loaded with clams!" Immediately I understood why she was prepared to drag a kayak through wet sand and muck. She was going fishing, and that's a small price to pay for pursuing one's passion. Shell fishing holds the same kind of excitement to

some folks that fly fishing does for me, and heaven knows what I go through for that.

On this late October trip I encountered all kinds of fishermen: a guy surfcasting into Cape Cod Canal during a driving rainstorm, kids floating bobbers from a bridge on the Bass River, boats rigged to troll for tuna heading out before dawn, people throwing crank baits for fresh water bass in a kettle pond.

Then there was my old buddy Tom, who is strictly a bait and lure guy. He and his wife often stay at the same place that Christine and I do, a resort located where the Parker River meets Nantucket Sound. Tom and I do not stay in contact in any way, but I always hope to see him when I'm on the water in Massachusetts. Our sole connection is happily sharing a favorite fishing spot together. Although he does not fly fish, Tom always shows great interest in my flies and tactics, and I learn a lot from his angling methods and experience. He and I have spent many productive hours fishing sideby-side from a dock on the Parker River. We say that we bring each other luck, but we had not seen each other in several years. Sure enough, my first striper of this trip came at the exact moment when Tom stepped onto the dock to say a long overdue "Hello".

As fly fishers, we are all part of a large and diverse family of recreational fishers. Although our methods differ, this family shares many common interests including ecology protection, public access, and love of nature. Unfortunately, our numbers are dwindling. Fewer people are fishing (in any way) with each passing year. Perhaps it's the economy, or some cultural trend like video games. Whatever the reasons, it does not bode well for our planet or for our future generations. You should be proud to be a member of a club that actively recruits and trains new fly fishers and tiers, and that supports the interests of our entire fishing family in many other ways.

The above quote comes from Russell Chatham, who has referred to fly fishing as "... a necessary passion". This 72-year old has authored several angling books and collections of essays which are at times quite ribald. He is best known as a painter. His intricate lithographs can each use up to 50 separate plates to portray the spiritual aspects of landscape and waterscape. Chatham grew up in the steelhead country of California and now makes his home near the Yellowstone River in Livingston, Montana.

The handout outlines his presentation topics including fly tying recipes and additional Atlantic salmon fishing and fly tying resources.

Phil is ready to renew your membership, which is especially important to the life of CFFA during these tough economic times. Scott and Jonathan have the extensive, and continuously growing, Goldman library open for free book loans.

After countless years of solo service, Walt needs help with the monthly meeting raffle. Please consider stepping-up to help out with this essential job. You get to handle a lot of neat gear, and it does not take much of your time.

With a full class of beginner tiers, Richard Gilligan encourages all members who tie flies to join us at 6:45 on Thursday nights at Cabela's to help with the students. More advanced tiers are invited to contact Gilli about leading one of the remaining classes, which end on November 17th. He could also use some help at the Newington VA on Thursday mornings throughout

the year. It was certainly an honor to have four recent vets from his program attend our last meeting.

There's plenty of fishing left in this season. Our salmon fishery is just cranking-up. So far 150 salmon have been released into the Shetucket River, 50 into Crystal Lake, 100 into Mount Tom Pond, and 100 into the Naugatuck River. These salmon range up to 18 pounds each. Following the spawn in November, DEEP expects to have approximately 500 more salmon available from its Kensington Hatchery. autumn's warm weather could keep saltwater fly rodders busy into December. The onset of cooler temperatures will make pike hunters happy. Smallies and bucket mouths can still be had. Over the past two months DEEP stocked 32,800 adult trout plus another 30,000 yearlings into our fresh waters. There's such an enormous variety of ways to fish, of people who fish, and of reasons to fish.

Whatever your motivation ... whatever your means ... fish hard!


#### NEXT BOARD MEETING NOV 2th NEXT CLUB MEETING NOV 9th
