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Montana October 2008 GARY STEINMILLER



September's presentation by John Springer on the Missouri River refreshed my memory of a fall trip I took to Montana in 2008 with CFFA members Jerry Wade, Guy Bagdasarian and Charlie Place (passed on but not forgotten).

Our 1st day was a drift on the Missouri with hired guides. The guides taught us what we needed to know to catch fish but most important where we could access the river the next few days on our own. We did not expect snow when we made our plans for our trip but here it was when we woke up the next morning. Luckily we had the clothes for it. The trout did not care that it was snowing and we didn't either. They continued to feed on the millions of midges that were hatching so we used the flies that our guide showed us and we caught fish. Nice fish.



The next part of our trip was spent in Dillon where we fished the Beaverhead and the Big Hole Rivers. Again we hired a guide for out 1st day on the Beaverhead and again we learned enough to help us when we returned on our own. The river was very low (too low to drift) and

the banks were snow covered. These two facts kept the crowds away. We had the river to ourselves

And once again the fish were willing to eat despite the cold. Small insects were hatching so we fished small flies to match them. We ended our trip with a drift on the Big

We would fish while drifting and stop and wade also. The fish here were not as large as the Missouri & Beaverhead

fish but were every bit as strong and beautiful.

That trip was 7 years ago. The clock continues to tick and the rivers continue to flow. I am so glad I met Charlie through our CFFA and had the opportunity to enjoy fly fishing with him and his friends.

About our speaker this month



Lets call the presentation: "Toothy Critters to Tunoids" which will cover many of the angling options we have around this area. I will focus on the ocean fishing. With a small mention of the pike and some northern species that would be a huge thrill for fly rod fishermen to catch. Saltwater rigs can handle either pike or muskies.

You want a fly rod slant, which I will give, but I do not use the long rods, decades of casting make it painful and difficult for me these days. Though back in the 70's for about five minutes I had a fly rod caught striper that beat the then current IGFA world record at 15 or 18 pounds, which was promptly topped by a fish twice plus times that size.

I'm now retired for about three years. Taught an "at risk" population of high school kids for about 23 years. Was regional director CT and RI for Ducks Unlimited for five years prior to that, and was a the Recreational Fisheries Biologist for the Connecticut then DEP, now DEEP.

Have been a free lance writer photographer for the entire time. Learned to take photos because they sell stories. Have a column in the Norwich Bulletin every other Thursday (was weekly for 43 years but budgets shrunk so now it is biweekly), have published in national and regional magazines ranging from species specific publications such as Musky Hunter Magazine, to Outdoor Life. I have a story coming out in September 2016 Deer and

Deer Hunting, a feature that the editor told me was going to be the "back page" feature , which is an honor of sorts.

Fishing, hunting and writing are the three things I'm best at and enjoy the most. I am currently working on rebuilding my freelance writing and seminar business, being I'm on a fixed income that keeps me pretty will "fixed to my home" much of the time.


The gear that is perfect for stripers in the ocean is a perfect size for the large pike lurking in some Connecticut lakes these days.
