Being a pain in the ass, By John Springer


Several years ago the state of Connecticut was involved with FREC and re-licensing of the dam at Scotland Ct. First Light power owns this dam on the Shetucket River. Somehow someone at DEEP signed off on an agreement with the power company that would allow them to have a several inches of water to hold back at the Scotland Dam. The reason for this several inches was explained to me this way. Should the wind be blowing down river it would be possible that the water could be going over the dam faster than what was coming into the impoundment above the dam so it would not be "run of the river". The power company took the position that this meant they could hold back this water and each time the impoundment grew to the top, they would turn on the generator and let the water come though and raise the river back up until the water behind the impoundment dropped down this several inches. If you fished the river during this 2 year period you know that the water was coming up and going back down many times a day. This made fishing very difficult. At the start when this was going on people told me the reasons for it were to blow out leaves from the dam in the fall, they were working on the new generator that would make power at a very low flow, or trees were stuck in the dam. I spoke to John Preston at Thames Valley TU and asked him if I could look into this for his chapter and John said ok. I got the number for the fellow in charge of the project Gary Smolen and called him. Long story short he informed me that the power company had the right to make money; the agreement on the Shetucket was not the same as on the Housatonic, that agreement was "natural flow". I explained to him what happens when the water goes up and down so many times a day; again he told me they had the right to make money. I thanked him for his time and the battle started. Bill Hyatt who runs DEEP now is someone I had known for almost 30 years so I called him about this. I explained what was going on he did not know about it and so the process started. Nothing in state government moves fast as we all know and meetings between the DEEP and Power Company started. At first the power company was not going to give in

but in time they caved in as I GUESS they learned the state had the upper hand. Bottom line is someone at state allowed that several inches for a reason and it was not for pond and release. It took many calls and my time to stay on top of what was going on but in the end we won. As I explained to Bill, fish have high water lies and low water lies and that water going up and down so many times a day simply drove the fish crazy. I also called First Light several times, sad to say my friend Gary retired and so I never got to tell him that yes you have the right to make money, but we have a right to fish. A fellow named Stewart took over his job he was not so cocky when we spoke. I never found out who at DEEP let the power company pull a fast one on us, but I do know one thing. One person becoming a pain in the ass can make a difference. Think about this next time you're asked to write a letter or make a call when something to do with our fishing comes up on the chopping block in Hartford.
