From the vest of the President

On Saturday May 14 CFFA held our 2nd annual tribute to former CFFA Member Gary Lafontaine at Salmon River. CFFA member Rick Liegl has led the coordination for this enjoyable day from the beginning. Some Fly Tying, Some Lying, Some Fly Casting instruction, Some Fishing. A good time was had by all that attended. Mr. Lafontaine would have enjoyed all of it. This day has become our new CFFA May meeting. We hope to see you at the 2023 event.

On Saturday June 25 CFFA joined together with Erin K. Kuprewicz, Ph.D. and Dr. Katrina Menard at the Connecticut State Museum of Natural History (CSMNH) on the UConn campus to teach students some of the history about bugs and how they relate to fly fishing. This was followed by a Fly Tying Workshop. Erin is the Natural History Engagement Specialist / Collections Manager and Dr. Menard is the Collection Manager, Invertebrates Ecology & Evolutionary Biology.

Dr. Menard began the day by providing the history, characteristics and needed requirements of the main group of bugs that live in rivers and streams that we fly fisher's try to imitate when fly fishing. This was followed by a tour of the specimen room led by Erin Kuprewicz. This room contained preserved specimens displayed in various glass tubes and shadow boxes where the students could observe every detail of every bug. All the students along with the 5 CFFA instructors enjoyed this part of the day very much.

The rest of the day was spent with the students learning how to imitate some of these bugs through the art of fly tying. We had 5 CFFA members volunteer for this portion of the day. A demonstration of the required tools and how to use each of them was performed first. This was followed by tying instructions for 2 Mayfly patterns a Caddis pattern and a Stonefly pattern.

All in all it was a very enjoyable and rewarding day passing along the traditions of fly fishing to some very enthusiastic students.

As we move into our Fall season we will be holding in person meetings beginning in September. We will not be meeting in East Hartford until the town completes their renovations on the clubhouse and other facilities throughout the town. All of our upcoming in person meetings will be held at the Pitkin Community Center at 30 Greenfield Street Wethersfield, CT 06109. We tried our best to schedule our meetings for the traditional 2nd Wednesday of the month but that was not possible. The following are the dates we have scheduled for the upcoming year. SBS Salt Water Bait Fish

Hook: FTD Big Game MS 100 hook Size 3/0 (or Short Shank Stinger Salt Water Hook of Choice).

Thread: UTC 70D White.

Tail: White Bucktail topped with strands of pearlescent

flash, topped with a single white saddle hackle.

1/2 Wing: Chartreuse bucktail tied over a 'bump' of White Senyo Lazer Dub and extending halfway down the tail.

Belly: White Bucktail tied in 'reverse style' then swept back under the hook shank.

Body: White Senyo Lazer Dub with Red Senyo Lazer Dub before the head of the fly.

Wing: Chartreuse Bucktail tied in 'reverse' style then swept back on top of the hook. Topped with a grizzly saddle hackle.

Eyes: 3 D molded eyes. **Finish:** Epoxy, or UV Resin.
