

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

Last summer I met Mike Lee while staying at the Driftwood Camp on the Madison River he shared something he figured out for floating CDC flies. As well all know they start to sink after a fish or two and we dry them and put something like Frogs Fanny on them. This is much better. You take a drop of this oil that you can order on Amazon rub it into the feather dry it with a tissue and put them in

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

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your box. AFTER you catch a fish or two you false cast 5 times. And your back in business. I found you must do it 5 times! Yes after a bit the fly will become matted down and must be washed dried and rubbed with the oil but I used 2 of his caddis flies the day he showed me this and I assure you it worked very well. 
One thing about the Jersey show is the programs going on all day it takes us 2 days to see the ones we want to see. Here are some pictures of flies I saw you

might be interested in. Should you decide to go and want a great place to eat that you will never forget go to Harolds its very close by, Google it.




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














Salmon River, Colchester Connecticut, Gulf Road, Picnic Area Join us for the 3rd Annual Tribute to Gary Lafontaine

Paul's FLY OF THE MONTH

Hook: Dai Riki #300 Size 14 or Dry Fly Hook of choice.

Thread: Purple Uni 6/0.

Tail: Moose Hair or Grizzly & Brown Hackle

Fibers.

Body: Purple Flexi Floss, or Purple Dubbing,

or Purple Thread.

Post: Calf Tail Fibers or Poly-yarn.

Hackle: Brown & Grizzly.

Finish: Bottom of the fly is coated with 'Tough

as Nails'.

Sailfish on a fly appealed as exotic, but was it really flyfishing? It looked like the crew did most of the work, teasing in the fish, then pulling a well-choreographed bait-and-switch to the angler's fly. But my wife would be away for a week at the end of January so why should I stay home? I thought I'd try something new.

The Pacific coast of Guatemala is not alone in calling itself the "Sailfish Capital of the World." But, among sailfish capitals of the world, it's probably the closest - a little under three hours from Miami. My long-time booking agent Doug Schlink of *Angler Adventures*, Old Lyme, recommended *Sailfish Oasis*. I booked my flights, but Doug did the rest, providing his first-hand knowledge of sailfishing and answering my slew of questions. https://

My first day out, I relaxed on my 31ft Bertram as Captain Manolo cruised around looking for fish. But you don't want to relax too much. When the crew yells "Sail, Sail," you have about 10 seconds to make your "cast." For me that meant flopping 20 feet of line out behind the boat and letting it drift back a little.

The first and second day, the "Sail, Sail" came a couple of times for fish which showed no real interest in engaging. I had to be satisfied with bonito and dorado (mahi-mahi). Lunch cooked on the boat that first day was dorado, filleted within five minutes of catching. Note on fish-handling: The crew is careful about handling sailfish which they regard as their livelihood. The dorado they see as food to be handled a little more aggressively.

Not memorable fishing those two days, but the aerial displays by huge schools of spinner dolphins was impressive. Look for videos online.

My third day, "Sail, Sail" turned serious. I blew my first chance by trying to set the hook on an incoming fish. You're supposed to wait for the fish to turn. I'm not sure I ever mastered that "wait for the fish to turn." The four sailfish I caught struck violently moving left-to-right, then accelerated away to a sailfish top speed of 60mph reached in two seconds. The action all starts on or near the surface 20 feet from where you're standing!

Good sailfish/bad sailfish: A good sailfish puts on a spectacular tail-walking display for ten minutes or so, by which time it has tired itself out. A bad sailfish puts on a much shorter tail-walking display, then sits unmoving on the bottom. Mine were all bad sailfish. My fourth took 1hr 20min.

Knowledgeable anglers tell me the fishing's usually much better where I was when I was. But I caught sailfish on a fly. I'm happy.

Gear: Sailfish Oasis recommends 13wt. I had 12wt, so that's what I brought. I bought a specialized billfish line, but I could have saved the money. You're not going for distance or finesse. You're trying to get an unwieldy fly on the water as quickly as you can.

Fly: Billfish tube fly. Any color as long as it's pink & white. Atlantic sailfish supposedly prefer blue & white.
