From the vest of the President



We ended our CFFA spring of 2023 with a flurry of very successful events that happened after the issue of our May newsletter. I write the following with the intention of filling you in on these events.

On Saturday April 22nd we held our casting instruction at the P&F pond in East Hartford. Eighteen students showed up and ten CFFA members also showed up as was written about in our May issue of Line & Leaders. Very soon after the casting instruction our final class happened on May 6 and took them to the Willimantic River TMA for an education on stream techniques and strategies. Each student was paired up with a CFFA member and spent the morning being guided along the river. Many thanks to all of the volunteers that participated in this very important



class and to Peter Naples for coordinating all of our Educational Classes throughout the year.

On May 13 CFFA gathered for our monthly membership meeting held on the banks of Salmon River. It was our 3rd Annual Tribute to Gary Lafontaine, Connecticut's most famous fly tier. Gary is a past CFFA member who started fly fishing at age 8, and published his first article at age 15. Winner of the Arnold Gingrich Memorial Award for Lifetime Writing Achievement, he published several books, with his "Caddisflies" gaining national attention. As a dedicated member of CFFA he inspired many members to try innovative approaches to tying and fishing for Trout and other species. In1996, he was awarded Angler of the Year by Fly Rod and Reel Magazine. Gary left this world at the age of 56 due to Lou Gehrig's Disease. We celebrated his legacy once again this spring with numerous fly tiers tying some of Gary's famous flies, members sharing memories and stories that involved Gary and also doing some fly fishing and story telling of our own. Sitting in a circle with long time veterans of CFFA Ken Parkany, Mark Phillipe, Myron Schulman, Gary Bogli, Ed Fidrich, Phil McCormick along some newbies who listened to our stories of past and present was truly enjoyable and something I'm sure Gary LaFontaine was enjoying in spirit. This event has blossomed into a real success and we should all thank CFFA member Rick Liegl for his effort with initiating the idea and making it happen.

The following event was our annual outing with the students that attend the American School for the Deaf.

Throughout the month of March and April a group students at the American School for the Deaf were taught to



tie flies under the leadership of Kevin Fuller with assistance from some members of CFFA. The outing took place at the Willington Fish and Game Club on May 23rd where each of the students got to test their hand made flies on the trout and panfish that inhabit the pond there. Once again we thank the Willington Fish and Game Club for the invitation to use their facilities while conducting this event. Not only did they invite us, their members participated and were the perfect hosts. Members of the club graciously used their boats to motor the students around the pond trolling their hand made flies they had created earlier in our classes. When a fish was hooked they stopped the boat and allowed each student to do battle with their prized catch. Other members that were not maneuvering a boat were busy preparing food for the wonderful buffet enjoyed by everyone in attendance. The students thoroughly enjoyed every aspect of the day and many sizable trout and panfish were brought to hand after being netted by "Al the Net Man". I believe Al also earned the nickname "Juggler" that day. Many photos of event can be found on our CFFA Facebook Page.

The final successful event happened on the University of Connecticut campus on June 10th. This is where our second annual Fly Tying Workshop took place. Staff members with the UConn's Biodiversity Research Collections and the Connecticut State Museum of Natural History began the day by educating the students with the identification, requirements, and life cycles of various aquatic invertebrates commonly found in a trout river or stream. Their presentation was followed by fly tying instruction aimed at imitating some of these invertebrates. This session was conducted by our CFFA instructors. Enrolled students surpassed all expectations and enjoyed being able to interact with experts in fly tying along with experts in the field of Entomology where they could observe and touch actual specimens of insects that are eaten by popular Connecticut gamefish. CFFA's contributions were coordinated by our Education Chairman Peter Naples with assistance from Bob Winot, Phil McCormick, and Phil Apruzzese. Thanks to everyone involved for making this event a success. We plan to do this in the future whenever we are asked to participate.

Throughout the summer many CFFA members could be found assisting the Newington chapter of Project Healing Waters. If is wasn't helping during a field trip involving fly fishing it was adding constructive advice during one of their frequent 30 minute Zoom calls. This is a very active chapter and it requires many volunteers to make it work. Your help is very much appreciated by me and the veterans registered in the program.

As we move forward to September and the resumption of our monthly meetings we will continue to meet in Wethersfield. The dates of our meetings beginning Monday September 18th through March of 2024 are listed on the

I can't thank Vicky for spending the time taking many of the pictures you see.



Paul's FLY OF THE MONTH

Albie Whore

Hook: Mustad 34007 Size #1 or #2 depending

on the Size of Fly to match bait. **Thread:** White, UTC 140 Denier

Tail: Two White or Tan Saddle Hackle Feathers splayed outward. Two strands of Pearlescent

Krystal Flash on each side.

Body: Pearlescent Chenille or Estaz in Chartreuse, Pink or Tan. Flanked by two more Saddle Hackles, splayed outward, the length of the body and tail; with a strip of Lateral Line on each side the length of Body & Tail. All affixed by a Hot Glue Gun or UV Resin.

Eyes: Stick on flat 1/8" eyes.
